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- 1 **THE COURT:** All right.
- 2 BY MR. WISE:
- Q. Now, Mr. Ward, I want to direct your attention to May of 2015.
- Did you participate in the search of the home of someone named Paul Jones, who also went by Pedro?
- 7 A. Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. And who wrote that search warrant?
- 9 A. Detective Taylor.
- 10 Q. And what, if anything, did you and Detective Taylor do
- 11 | prior to Detective Taylor writing the search warrant for
- 12 Mr. Jones' home?
- 13 **A.** First, we did a trash run on the location.
- 14 Q. What's a trash run? Could you explain that to the jury.
- 15 **A.** It's when you go to a location, a target house, the person
- 16 | you're investigating, and you pretty much take their trash and
- 17 | you go through it to see if you can find paraphernalia for like
- 18 narcotics and things like that.
- 19 Q. And when you and Mr. Taylor did the trash run -- well,
- 20 where did you do the trash -- describe how that happened.
- 21 Describe what the trash run looked like.
- 22 | A. We got Mr. Jones' address, went to the location at night,
- 23 | went into the backyard, pulled the trash out, took it to a
- 24 | location, and went through it.
- 25 **Q.** What did you find, if anything?

- 1 A. I believe it was marijuana residue and things like that.
- 2 **Q.** In the trash?
- 3 **A.** In the trash, yes.
- 4 **Q.** And then what happened?
- 5 **A.** Well, what we recovered from the trash was later
- 6 submitted, and then a warrant was obtained.
- 7 | Q. At some point did you learn something about that
- 8 trash run, I guess, prior to the warrant being presented to the
- 9 judge?
- 10 A. Yes; that the location that we pulled trash from wasn't
- 11 the right house. It was the wrong location.
- 12 Q. So it wasn't Mr. Jones' house?
- 13 **A.** No.
- 14 Q. And how did you learn that?
- 15 **A.** During a follow-up.
- 16 **Q.** And who was with you when you were doing the follow-up?
- 17 **A.** Myself and Detective Taylor.
- 18 Q. And did you and Detective Taylor talk about the fact that
- 19 | the trash wasn't from Mr. Jones' home where the marijuana
- 20 residue had been found?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 **Q.** And so did you -- what happened then?
- 23 | A. Well, I told -- I said I wasn't going to do the warrant
- 24 | because it was primarily my -- my investigation, but
- 25 Detective Taylor said he would do it; he didn't care.

- 1 Q. So what was then actually presented to the judge?
- 2 A. A warrant for the wrong -- I mean for the right address
- 3 but the trash -- the evidence wasn't right. It was wrong.
- 4 | Q. And what was the basis in the warrant for going into
- 5 Mr. Jones' house?
- 6 A. I did observations. It was a trash run. It was all for
- 7 | narcotics.
- 8 Q. So was the fact that the trash had actually been pulled
- 9 | from the wrong house told to the judge?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. But how -- was it -- was that disclosed? I mean, was the
- 12 | judge told that you all pulled trash from the wrong house or
- 13 did the warrant say the trash had come from Jones' house?
- 14 A. The warrant said that it came from Mr. Jones' house.
- 15 **Q.** So was that true?
- 16 **A.** No, sir.
- 17 | Q. And I think you said you didn't want to do the warrant at
- 18 | that point?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** But Detective Taylor did?
- 21 A. Yeah, he said he would do it.
- 22 | Q. And did he?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 **Q.** And then was there a search at Mr. Jones' house?
- 25 **A.** Yes, there was. We executed a search warrant at

- 1 Mr. Jones' house.
- 2 Q. And what was found at Mr. Jones' house, if you remember?
- 3 A. I know it was a couple guns, and I think like some heroin
- 4 or some cocaine, I believe.
- 5 **Q.** And was Mr. Jones subsequently arrested?
- 6 A. Yes, he was.
- 7 Q. I want to switch topics now. I think this will be my last
- 8 topic, Mr. Ward.
- 9 At some point did you learn that you and other members of
- 10 | the Gun Trace Task Force were under investigation?
- 11 **A.** Yes.
- 12 Q. And we -- I'll break this up. But, first, who did you
- 13 learn that from? Who all did you learn that from?
- 14 A. The first person was our supervisor, Sergeant Jenkins.
- 15 He --
- 16 **Q.** And what did he tell you?
- 17 A. One day he advised us that Rayam and Gondo were under
- 18 | federal investigation for stealing and selling drugs.
- 19 Q. And who did he -- who was with you when he told you that?
- 20 A. It was me, Taylor, and Hendrix.
- 21 | Q. And how, if any -- or how did he tell you, if he did, how
- 22 | he had learned that?
- 23 **A.** He told us he -- it was -- we were at the in-service at
- 24 | the academy one day, and he had bumped into a former partner of
- 25 | his, Sergeant Guinn or Ginn -- I'm not sure how to pronounce

- 1 his last name -- he said told Jenkins that two federal agents
- 2 | had approached him that day to question him about Gondo and
- 3 Rayam about them supposedly stealing drugs and reselling it on
- 4 the streets.
- 5 Q. Were Gondo and Rayam there when he told you this?
- 6 **A.** No.
- 7 Q. Do you know if he also told them what he had learned?
- 8 A. No, he didn't tell them.
- 9 Q. Was that the only time Sergeant Jenkins told you he had
- 10 | learned that the Gun Trace Task Force was under investigation?
- 11 A. To my memory, yes.
- 12 Q. Were there other members of the Gun Trace Task Force who,
- 13 | after Sergeant Jenkins told you this, also told you that they
- 14 | had learned the task force was under investigation?
- 15 **A.** Yes; Taylor did also.
- 16 **Q.** And what did Taylor tell you?
- 17 **A.** He told me he met with a source one day from
- 18 | Internal Affairs that told him that -- that they were
- 19 | investigating our overtime; they were tracking our phone; they
- 20 | had trackers on our cars and things like that.
- 21 Q. And I think you said this on Wednesday, but what's --
- 22 | where is Internal Affairs? Is that part of the Baltimore
- 23 | Police Department or the -- what agency is that part of?
- 24 | A. Yes. It's part of the Baltimore City Police Department.
- 25 | It's like the police who investigate the police.

Did anyone else, after Jenkins and Taylor told you 1 Q. this, tell you that they had learned that the 2 Gun Trace Task Force was under investigation? 3 Those were the only two that told me. 4 5 MR. WISE: Nothing further, Your Honor. THE COURT: All right. Thank you. 6 Mr. Nieto. 7 Thank you, Your Honor. 8 MR. NIETO: 9 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. NIETO: 10 11 All right. So just to piggyback on what Mr. Wise had just asked you, you just testified with regards to a conversation 12 you had with Jenkins about an investigation into Rayam and 13 Gondo; correct? 14 15 Yes, sir. Α. Okay. And you said that it was Sergeant Guinn or Ginn who 16 17 told him? 18 Yes, sir. Α. 19 All right. Now, did Sergeant Jenkins tell you this via 20 e-mail?
- 21 **A.** No. Face-to-face conversation.
- 22 Q. Okay. So he didn't text you. He didn't write you a
- 23 letter. This was an actual conversation that you guys had;
- 24 right?
- 25 **A.** Yes.

- 1 | Q. But you don't know how to pronounce that sergeant's name?
- 2 A. No. I can spell it for you. G-I-N-N. I don't know --
- 3 | Q. Right. I know. It's as if you'd seen the name written
- 4 down, and no one had actually said the name to you; right? I
- 5 | mean, that's why you don't know how to pronounce the name.
- 6 A. No, 'cause I've heard it pronounced different, so I'm not
- 7 | sure if it's "Guinn" or "Ginn."
- 8 Q. So which way did Jenkins pronounce it to you?
- 9 A. I don't recall the exact way he pronounced it to me.
- 10 Q. Okay. So your inability to pronounce the name has nothing
- 11 to do with just seeing it written. It just has to do with
- 12 other people pronouncing it differently?
- 13 A. Correct.
- 14 Q. But you don't remember how Sergeant Jenkins pronounced it
- 15 | when he told you this piece of information?
- 16 **A.** No.
- 17 | Q. Now, sir, you had met with federal agents and the
- 18 | prosecutors to my left on more than seven occasions since April
- 19 of last year; is that right?
- 20 | A. I believe so, yes.
- 21 Q. Take a moment and think about it, if you could recall the
- 22 | number of times you met with them.
- 23 | A. I couldn't tell you the exact amount. It was several
- 24 occasions though.
- 25 | Q. It was several; right? More than five?

- 1 A. Possibly, yes.
- 2 Q. And that's just in terms of you providing information and
- 3 cooperating; right?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 **Q.** And that's not even considering the -- sort of the trial
- 6 | prep; right? 'Cause I'm assuming you met with these agents to
- 7 | prepare your testimony for today.
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 **Q.** And for earlier this week?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. How many times did you go through the questions and
- 12 | answers that you were going to provide to this jury this week?
- 13 **A.** Repeat that question, please.
- 14 Q. Fair enough.
- 15 How many times did you meet with federal agents and
- 16 | prosecutors to go through your testimony?
- 17 **A.** Maybe twice.
- 18 Q. Twice; right? Recently --
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** -- right?
- 'Cause you started meeting with them back in April or
- 22 March of 2017.
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. Okay. I'm not trying to trick you up. Just say the
- 25 | answers if you know them, all right?

- So -- and part of the whole process of prepping you for
- 2 your answers is that you come across more credible; right?
- 3 A. I believe so.
- 4 | Q. Right. Because you've testified in court before, this
- 5 | isn't the first time you've done that; right?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. Right. So they want to go through the questions and the
- 8 answers so there's some fluidity with your responses.
- 9 **A.** That was a question?
- 10 Q. Yes, sir. Is that correct?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. Right. And that's important for you, too, because
- 13 Judge Blake is the one who's going to be sentencing you when
- 14 | this is all said and done; right?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. And you want her to believe that you're credible and that
- 17 | you're substantially assisting this investigation; isn't that
- 18 | correct?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 Q. All right. Now, have you ever lied on the witness stand
- 21 before?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. How many times?
- 24 **A.** I'm not sure of the exact answer, number of that.
- 25 Q. Can you quess?

- 1 A. Several times.
- 2 Q. "Several" meaning more than five?
- 3 **A.** Possibly, yes.
- 4 **Q.** More than ten?
- 5 A. No, I don't think so.
- 6 Q. All right. So a half dozen, something like that?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. You've come into court -- I'm assuming state court?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 **Q.** Federal Court or no?
- 11 **A.** No.
- 12 Q. All right. So in state court. And the oath that they
- 13 give you in state court is the same oath they give you -- that
- 14 | they gave you this week; right?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 **Q.** Okay. And do you remember what that oath is?
- 17 **A.** Not exactly, no.
- 18 **Q.** Right.
- So do you remember which cases they were in which you lied
- 20 under oath in court?
- 21 A. Would have been cases in the Gun Trace Task Force.
- 22 **Q.** I understand that, sir.
- Do you remember any of those cases in particular?
- 24 A. No, sir.
- 25 **Q.** Any of the names of the defendants?

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- 1 A. No, sir, not off the top of my head no.
- 2 Q. Do you remember the name of the prosecutors involved in
- 3 | the case?
- 4 A. Yes; Mr. -- ASA Kropp, yes.
- 5 **Q.** Okay. And is that --
- 6 A. That's one of the -- that's a State's Attorney. I'm
- 7 | sorry. He was one of the State's Attorneys.
- 8 Q. Is that in relation --
- 9 THE COURT: Wait. One at a time, please.
- 10 MR. NIETO: I'm sorry, Your Honor.
- 11 **THE COURT:** Go ahead.
- 12 BY MR. NIETO:
- 13 Q. Assistant State's Attorney Kropp?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. Is that the Demetrius Brown/Oreese Stevenson
- 16 motions hearing?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. You testified at that?
- 19 **A.** No.
- 20 Q. Okay. But you had lied to him?
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 **Q.** All right. Who else had you lied to?
- 23 **A.** I can't name them off the top of my head, sir.
- 24 Q. Too many to remember?
- 25 A. No. I just can't remember.

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- 1 Q. Okay. Now, after you were arrested in this case, you
- 2 were -- how were you arrested? Let's go through that. How
- 3 were you arrested, do you remember?
- 4 **A.** For this case right here?
- 5 Q. Yes, sir.
- 6 A. We were called down to Internal Affairs to give a
- 7 statement, arrested.
- 8 Q. And I'm sorry. I don't mean to interject.
- 9 Have you been arrested in other matters?
- 10 **A.** No, sir.
- 11 Q. Okay. So in this particular case, how did they arrest
- 12 you?
- 13 **A.** I don't understand what you're asking, sir.
- 14 Q. Fair enough.
- They called you down to Internal Affairs; right?
- 16 A. Yes. That's what I said, sir, yes.
- 17 | Q. Yes. Right. Now, there wasn't an actual meeting with any
- 18 | Internal Affairs officers at that point, was there?
- 19 **A.** No, sir.
- 20 **Q.** No. But it was not an ambush, but they set you up to show
- 21 | up so that they could arrest you?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. Okay. And do you know -- is that your understanding
- 24 | that's what happened with the other members of the task force?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. All right. Now, when you were arrested -- and do you
- 2 remember what date that was?
- 3 **A.** March the 1st.
- 4 Q. March the 1st. Okay.
- 5 And then you were appointed an attorney?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. All right. And he's in the courtroom today; right?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. Over my right shoulder in the corner (indicating)?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. All right. And you met with him and you discussed the
- 12 case?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. And you had an opportunity to receive and review the
- 15 | indictment; right?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. All right. Now, the indictment laid out the accusations.
- 18 It gave specific instances of what the Government said you
- 19 broke the law.
- 20 Do you remember reviewing that?
- 21 **A.** Yes, I remember looking at it, yes.
- 22 | Q. Yeah. And it was like 15 to 20 pages, maybe. I mean
- 23 | there was a lot there; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 **Q.** And after you reviewed the indictment, you had an initial

- 1 appearance?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And that's when you came to court and they explained to
- 4 you what the charges were, made sure you had an attorney.
- 5 Do you remember that?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. And then the Government sought to keep you detained while
- 8 this case was pending?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And you asked for, through your attorney, a detention
- 11 hearing; right?
- 12 **A.** Well, it was automatic -- one was automatically given to
- 13 us.
- 14 Q. Oh, that's fair. So you didn't ask for a detention
- 15 | hearing. You just had a hearing as to whether you could be
- 16 | released while this case was pending; right?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. And do you remember when that detention hearing
- 19 was?
- 20 A. I believe it was March the 2nd, the day after we got
- 21 arrested.
- 22 | Q. Right. So very close in time to when you got arrested,
- 23 | you had your detention hearing; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 **Q.** And your attorney stood up and advocated for you and

- 1 explained why you should go home?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 Q. All right. And then the Government, was it Mr. Hines or
- 4 | was it Mr. Wise who stood up at that hearing?
- 5 A. Mr. Wise.
- 6 Q. Mr. Wise. So Mr. Wise stood up, and he further outlined
- 7 | the information they had about this investigation.
- 8 Do you remember that?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. And you were seated in the same courtroom listening to
- 11 Mr. Wise explain all the ways in which you broke the law.
- Do you remember that, sir?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Okay. And so you were detained?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. All right. Now, you were not housed in Baltimore City,
- 17 | were you?
- 18 **A.** No, sir.
- 19 Q. Okay. And, in fact, you are currently -- you were moved
- 20 to Howard County, as I believe the questions have been posed;
- 21 right?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 **Q.** Okay. And you're no longer at Howard County?
- 24 **A.** No, sir.
- 25 \ Q. You're much further away from Baltimore City?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. A few hours, to say, at least; right?
- 3 **A.** Possible, yes.
- 4 Q. Approximately; right?
- 5 And you have a family?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 | Q. All right. And I'm sure coming to visit you can't be easy
- 8 for them?
- 9 A. They make it, so . . .
- 10 Q. Right. I mean it can't be easy because it's a long drive
- 11 | to get to you; right?
- 12 A. It's a drive, yes.
- 13 Q. It's a drive. Well, it's a couple-hour drive; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes.
- 15 Q. One way. So it's even more hours coming back --
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 **Q.** -- is that fair to say?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. Not to mention they have to see you in custody, behind
- 20 bars?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 **Q.** All right. That's difficult?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 Q. All right. And you know this, of course; right?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

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- 1 Q. All right. Now, the -- as part of your agreement, you 2 signed -- strike that.
- So after all of these things happened, right, you decided to sit down with the Government and explain to them what was
- 5 going on; is that fair to say?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 **Q.** Okay. And that happened the first time in April?
- 8 A. I believe so.
- 9 Q. April 19th, approximately; does that sound right to you?
- 10 A. It's possible, yes.
- 11 Q. Right. So a good six weeks after you had been arrested?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. All right. You decided to sit down and talk with the
- 14 gentleman and lady to my left; right?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. All right. Now, during that session, they give you some
- 17 | paperwork to give you some protection; right?
- Do you remember signing the proffer agreement?
- 19 **A.** Yes.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. And that proffer agreement says: We're not going
- 21 to use any of this against you so long as you tell us the
- 22 truth?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 Q. Okay. And they also say that if you are not 100 percent
- 25 | truthful, if you withhold information, if you minimize your

- 1 | role or try to protect anyone, deal's off; right? That was
- 2 your understanding of the agreement?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. Okay. And you had an attorney there to help explain it to
- 5 you?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. In fact, Mr. Wise then explained it to you before you
- 8 started talking, even though you had already gone through it
- 9 with your attorney?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. All right. Now, the definition of "truth," right, as to
- 12 | if you are not truthful with us, that's the Government who
- 13 | makes that determination; isn't that right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. So if you say something that you believe to be the
- 16 | truth and the Government or the agents disagree with you,
- 17 | you're the one who's out of luck; right?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. Now, in your plea agreement that you had entered and
- 20 | signed a few months later -- right? Do you remember that?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 Q. All right. Now, there's a stipulation of fact. There's a
- 23 | rundown that they say: You are admitting these are the facts
- 24 | that the Government could prove if this case had proceeded to

- 7 out, sent to your attorney as a letter; right?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 Q. Now, you didn't write the statement of facts, did you?
- 10 **A.** No, sir.
- 11 Q. The Government wrote the statement of facts.
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 **Q.** All right. Did you make any changes?
- 14 A. No, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. So you had accepted or had to accept what they were
- 16 | saying were the facts of this case; otherwise, you get nothing?
- 17 A. Well, I didn't have to accept it, but . . .
- 18 | Q. Oh, well, what would happen if you didn't accept it, sir?
- 19 **A.** I probably would have had to go to trial.
- 20 **Q.** Probably had to go to trial. And you didn't want to go to

- 10 is that your understanding?

So insofar as I can streamline it or there's more of a foundation that needs to be laid, I have no problem doing that.

THE COURT: I just don't -- we don't know yet whether he even looked at those or what he was told about the guidelines. I mean, the plea agreement itself, I'm not sure it even comes to a final offense level that doesn't actually subtract the three from the thirty-two, and it certainly doesn't say exactly what the guidelines are.

- 1 information that can lead to a more significant arrest and
- 2 investigation; is that fair to say?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. And that was commonly used; correct?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And as far as you know, there's nothing wrong with that,
- 7 is there?
- 8 A. Correct.
- 9 Q. Now, you would work in a plainclothes capacity; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Now, would you be dressed the way you're dressed now?
- 12 **A.** No, sir.
- 13 Q. No. Right. I mean, the -- you weren't driving around in
- 14 | police cars.
- 15 **A.** No, no, sir.
- 16 **Q.** They were rental vehicles; right?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. Sort of four-door but small sedans, oftentimes?
- 19 **A.** Yes. Yes.
- 20 **Q.** And part of that is that you want to blend in; right?
- 21 | A. You can say that, but the whole city knew what type of
- 22 | vehicles we drove and so we weren't really blending in.
- 23 Q. That's fair.
- 24 But you're not going into bad neighborhoods in a
- 25 | black-and-white police car, are you?

- 1 A. No, sir.
- 2 Q. You're not going into these bad neighborhoods with the
- 3 blue and red lights flashing, are you?
- 4 **A.** No, sir.
- 5 Q. So there's an attempt to be covert about it. You don't
- 6 | want everyone to know you're the police; otherwise, they're not
- 7 going to do anything in front of you. That's fair to say?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. Right. And so that's why they have unmarked vehicles;
- 10 | right?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. That's also the same reason why you guys wouldn't wear
- 13 | police uniforms; correct?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Now, there is -- I mean, you're right. It's odd to see
- 16 | four grown men in a four-door Dodge Neon driving around
- 17 | West Baltimore; right? That stands out a little bit?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. Right. But there's still -- you guys do things to try to
- 20 offset that; is that fair to say?
- 21 **A.** I don't understand what you're saying.
- 22 | Q. Well, did you, for example, you know -- and I don't know
- 23 | if this is true, but had you -- were you aware or did you ever
- 24 | see detectives put like baseball hats in the back windshield to
- 25 | make it look like a more normal car? Did you ever hear that?

- 1 **A.** No.
- 2 Q. Did you ever hear of like putting teddy bears or doing
- 3 different things so that at first blush, it wouldn't look like
- 4 | an undercover police officer?
- 5 **A.** No, sir.
- 6 Q. Did you do anything like that --
- 7 **A.** No, sir.
- 8 Q. -- to avoid detection?
- 9 **A.** No, sir.
- 10 Q. Okay. Now, with your outfits, right, I mean, the sort of
- 11 de facto plainclothes police officer uniform is oftentimes
- 12 | jeans and running sneakers; is that fair to say?
- 13 **A.** It's 50/50.
- 14 Q. 50/50; right? I mean, when it's warm, it's shorts. But
- 15 | you always have sneakers on; right?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 | Q. Not like the sneakers that you're wearing today; correct?
- 18 **A.** No, sir.
- 19 Q. Right. And you wouldn't wear shoes, the likes of which
- 20 I'm wearing (indicating). You'd have sneakers because you may
- 21 have to run --
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 **Q.** -- right?
- 24 And so guys will notice if a group of four men are going
- 25 around with jeans and running sneakers. They might think that

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- 1 they're the police; right?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 Q. Okay. So you want -- you're trying to blend in as best
- 4 | you can because you don't want people to identify you as police
- 5 officers before you can do your job; is that fair?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. Okay. And there's a term, they call undercovers knockers;
- 8 | right? Have you heard that term?
- 9 A. Yes, sir, I've heard it.
- 10 Q. And so if you drive into an area and you hear someone yell
- 11 | "knockers," what does that mean to you?
- 12 **A.** They alerting us -- the area that the police are there.
- 13 **Q.** Right. And if you're the police, that means you've been
- 14 identified?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 Q. What happens, in your experience, when someone yells
- 17 | "knockers" when police are in the area?
- 18 **A.** Everybody's on standstill and trying to find out where the
- 19 knockers are at, the police.
- 20 **Q.** Right. Nobody does anything; right?
- 21 **A.** Some people might walk away, but no one really does
- 22 anything.
- 23 **Q.** Right. Drug dealing ceases for that brief time; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 **Q.** Or people just leave the area because police are there?

- 1 A. Correct.
- 2 Q. Okay. Now, you specifically were interested in joining
- 3 the Gun Trace Task Force because the hours were better and
- 4 | there was unlimited overtime; correct?
- 5 **A.** No.
- 6 Q. That's not true?
- 7 **A.** No.
- 8 Q. Well, you didn't have to work weekends with the task
- 9 | force; right?
- 10 **A.** No.
- 11 **Q.** Right. And there were eight-hour days; correct?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. So you didn't tell the agents that part of the benefit of
- 14 | joining this group was the unlimited overtime and the better
- 15 hours?
- 16 A. That was with the SES unit.
- 17 Q. That was with the SES unit?
- 18 A. We initially were SES, and then we were just merged with
- 19 Gun Trace.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. So --
- 21 **A.** I didn't apply to be in Gun Trace.
- 22 Q. So the SES is -- I'm sorry.
- 23 So SES is sort of like the precursor to the
- 24 | Gun Trace Task Force; right?
- 25 **A.** There is SES. The side I was on was enforcement. Then

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- 1 | there's the Gun Trace Task Force, which is like the
- 2 investigative side.
- 3 Q. Okay. So you joined the SES because of the unlimited
- 4 overtime and because you didn't have to work weekends?
- 5 A. Well, no. I joined Jenkins' squad because of that, not
- 6 the SES.
- 7 | Q. Okay. All right. And you were working with Hendrix,
- 8 | Ivery, and Suiter in the undercover squad; right?
- 9 **A.** No, sir.
- 10 Q. No? Did you work with Hendrix, Ivery, or Suiter at any
- 11 point?
- 12 A. Yes; different times, yes, I worked with them.
- 13 **Q.** Different times, okay. And you had a longstanding working
- 14 | relationship with Hendrix, didn't you?
- 15 A. I just met Hendrix when I joined Jenkins' squad.
- 16 **Q.** And when was that?
- 17 A. It was in 2015, I believe.
- 18 **Q.** Okay.
- 19 **A.** 2014, 2015.
- 20 **Q.** But you guys were friends?
- 21 A. Once I got to know him, yes.
- 22 **Q.** You guys knew each other's families?
- 23 **A.** Eventually, yes.
- 24 Q. Right. Spent time together?
- 25 **A.** Yes.

- 1 Q. All right. When you were incarcerated in Howard County
- 2 Detention Center, you spoke with him?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. You discussed the case with him?
- 5 **A.** No, not really.
- 6 **Q.** Not really?
- 7 **A.** No.
- 8 Q. Or not at all?
- 9 A. No, not really, no.
- 10 Q. Well, what does that mean, "not really"?
- 11 **A.** That mean we didn't sit down every day and talk about the
- 12 case. We tried to keep our minds off of it.
- 13 Q. Okay. But you did talk to him about it?
- 14 A. Yeah, of course. When we first got arrested, yes, we did
- 15 talk about it. But --
- 16 **Q.** And that, of course, all -- you discussed the case with
- 17 | him prior to meeting with the federal agents in March?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 **Q.** Or April; right?
- 20 All right. Now, as you testified initially,
- 21 Detective Taylor was not part of the squad, was he?
- 22 **A.** Originally, no.
- 23 Q. Correct.
- So it was you, Jenkins, right, your friend Hendrix, that
- 25 | was the group?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 Q. All right. And then Detective Taylor started off because
- 3 he was working overtime with you guys?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. Okay. And he was a fast runner; is that fair to say?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. And not to mention his motion-sickness issues, but he
- 8 | would sit in the front seat because he was the quy who would
- 9 inevitably be the one tasked with chasing suspects; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Okay. So he caught many of the people that he chased;
- 12 right?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Okay. And that's an invaluable aspect to the work that
- 15 | you're doing; isn't that fair to say?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. So it's -- and maybe -- I don't want to put words in your
- 18 | mouth. Would you agree that it's common in your line of work
- 19 | for targets or suspects to run when they detect police?
- 20 A. Is it common?
- 21 Q. Would you say it's common, sir?
- 22 **A.** No.
- 23 | Q. Does it happen?
- 24 **A.** It happens, yes.
- 25 Q. Does it happen often?

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- 1 A. No, not often.
- 2 Q. Not often?
- 3 A. Unless they're -- unless they're being chased.
- 4 Q. Unless they're being chased. Okay.
- 5 So a rental car filled with police officers not in uniform
- 6 drive into an area, and you guys get out of the car to
- 7 | investigate crime. You're telling me that those individuals
- 8 don't run?
- 9 A. No, not all times, no.
- 10 Q. Not all the time. Okay.
- But, you know, part of the reason that you're wearing
- 12 | sneakers is because you've got to run sometimes; right?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 Q. It doesn't happen so infrequently that you can get by
- 15 | wearing regular dress shoes, can you?
- 16 A. Correct.
- 17 | Q. Okay. And obviously the point of this group, the point of
- 18 | what you were doing even before the Gun Trace Task Force, is to
- 19 get guns off the street; that fair to say?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 Q. And that's dangerous work, isn't it?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. All right. Many of the people you are targeting are armed
- 24 | with weapons; right?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

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- 1 Q. And they've got criminal histories for crimes of violence.
- 2 That's common or you've seen that happen?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. All right. They've been arrested before, often, as I
- 5 | said, for crimes of violence, sometimes for drug distribution;
- 6 right?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. You don't know what you're walking into, do you?
- 9 **A.** No, sir.
- 10 Q. So you've got to be prepared for the worst-case scenario?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. All right. In fact, there was an officer -- and officers
- 13 | can obviously get hurt in this line of work --
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 **Q.** -- right?
- So there was an Officer McCauley, who I believe who had
- 17 | actually injured his wrist during a foot chase and an eventual
- 18 | takedown at one point in time; right?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** Was he in the Gun Trace Task Force, or was he SES?
- 21 A. That was SES.
- 22 **Q.** That was SES. Okay.
- Now, of course, as part of your job and as part of what
- 24 | the detectives are doing, much of the work you have is not
- 25 | focused on patrolling some of the better parts of the city, is

- 1 it?
- 2 **A.** No, sir.
- 3 Q. Right. You're not targeting Roland Park or Fells Point,
- 4 | some of those nicer areas; right? You're focused on where
- 5 | violent crimes happen; right?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 **Q.** And you patrol those areas often and repeatedly?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. So you'll start to see some of the same individuals on the
- 10 | same street corners; right?
- 11 **A.** Yes.
- 12 Q. And maybe you'll go up to them under some ruse to be able
- 13 to get their identification so that you know who they are;
- 14 right?
- 15 A. I don't understand what you mean by "ruse."
- 16 Q. All right. So you can go up to -- per your understanding,
- 17 | right, you can go up to a group of guys or some guy that's sort
- 18 of loitering on the corner and ask him for his identification;
- 19 right?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 **Q.** And you can try to identify who that person is?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 Q. And once you take that identity, well, then you can go and
- 24 | investigate; is that fair to say?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. You can run him through, figure out if he's got a rap
- 2 | sheet; right?
- 3 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 4 | Q. Run him through to see if he has any open warrants,
- 5 | anything like that?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. You have these central databases in the police department
- 8 | which will tell you if you're members of a gang or if there's
- 9 some particular issues of note; is that fair to say?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Right. And so then if you patrol these areas often and
- 12 repeatedly and you see that same gentleman, you know a little
- 13 | bit more about him than you did initially; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. All right. Now, when you're doing this work, you develop
- 16 | a sense about the people you're targeting; is that fair to say,
- 17 or is that too open-ended?
- 18 A. Yeah. I don't understand what you mean by "sense."
- 19 **Q.** That's poorly constructed. Okay.
- 20 So you're trained, both through the police department and
- 21 | through everyday work, to notice things about their person or
- 22 | about their pockets or about the way they walk that regular
- 23 | laypeople may not understand; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** Right. You're trained to identify signs of someone being

- 1 | armed; right?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. Because for the most part, for the most part, you don't
- 4 | have people just walking down the street with a gun in their
- 5 hand, waving it out in the open (indicating), are there?
- 6 A. Correct.
- 7 Q. Right. So they'll have it in their hoodie pockets.
- 8 They'll have it in their dip area; right? Which is the
- 9 waistband area; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. They'll have it in their pockets, or they'll use a stash.
- 12 Like they'll hide it behind a tree. Or they'll put it in a
- 13 | stash house; right? Which is another area like a building
- 14 | where they can stash things; right?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. Right. So you're trained to be able to look at these
- 17 | people and see, oh, this pocket's hanging a little bit lower
- 18 | than this one. That's a sign to me, as a police officer, that
- 19 | they may be armed; right?
- 20 A. Possibly, yes.
- 21 **Q.** Possibly; right? And that -- and then you can go forward
- 22 | with your investigation; correct?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. In fact, there's case law -- are you familiar -- were you
- 25 | trained on the case law on how to determine if someone's armed

- 1 or not?
- 2 **A.** Yes, we've had training on case law, yes.
- 3 Q. Right. Exactly. So you can stay within the boundaries of
- 4 | the law while you do your investigations; right?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And that's not just you, Mr. Ward. That is the police
- 7 department; right? And the other detectives working in these
- 8 | same force -- these same squads; right?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Okay. And obviously the identification of these clues,
- 11 | they're very important for you, number one, to determine if
- 12 | it's going to be an arrest, but also, number two, to make sure
- 13 | that you are safe; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. Because people in Baltimore City often, who are
- 16 | carrying guns or are selling drugs, will do things to avoid
- 17 | arrest; right?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 **Q.** Sometimes they might even be on probation; right?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 **Q.** So there's an added penalty if they get arrested; correct?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. Or God forbid they're on parole, which means they're
- 24 | technically still serving a sentence, so they've got even more
- 25 | to lose; right?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. So they're trying to avoid detection; they're trying to
- 3 | avoid arrest; and they're trying to avoid going to jail; is
- 4 | that fair to say?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. Now, through you and the squad's work, you are targeting
- 7 drug dealers and violent criminals; right?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. Okay. Now, you would not and you did not, the four of
- 10 you, roll up on Grandma or Grandpa, who are just sitting on a
- 11 park bench, unless you had some reason to believe that they
- 12 | were involved in some criminal activity; right?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Now, you would use other investigative tools to your
- 15 advantage. So, for example, you would locate and surveil, for
- 16 | lack of a better phrase, like a head shop; right? Do you
- 17 remember doing that?
- 18 A. Say it again.
- 19 **Q.** Like a head shop?
- 20 A. A head shop?
- 21 | Q. Head, like where they sell bongs and rolling papers and
- 22 | stuff like that. Did you ever do that?
- 23 A. No.
- 24 Q. Did you ever go to one of the gun ranges like on the
- 25 | outskirts of the city?

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- 1 A. Did I personally do it? No.
- 2 Q. But you're aware of that technique; right?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Because when you go to the gun ranges, you have to sign in
- 5 | and you've got to use your ID; right?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. And so it's real simple for a police officer or a
- 8 detective to go get the list of who was there and just see
- 9 whether or not they have criminal convictions; correct?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Because with a criminal conviction that carries a penalty
- 12 | more than a year, you're not allowed to possess a firearm, are
- 13 you?
- 14 A. No, sir.
- 15 Q. And that's both a state and a federal offense, isn't it?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. So it's easy arrests because guys will do that, won't
- 18 they?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** All right. Now, what about the -- what are herbal stores
- 21 | that will sell drug-packaging materials; are you aware of
- 22 those?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. Okay. And so in those particular locations, they sell
- 25 | large quantities of gelcaps and packaging materials that are

- 1 oftentimes used by drug dealers; right?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 | Q. And so you can go to a place like that, and you can take a
- 4 look at it and you can observe who comes and goes; right?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And that's something that you guys actually did; right?
- 7 **A.** Correct.
- 8 Q. Called The Joint; do you remember that place?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Okay. And so you had a standing agreement or
- 11 understanding with the owners of that store; right?
- 12 A. No, I didn't.
- 13 Q. You didn't, but did the squad?
- 14 A. I believe just Jenkins.
- 15 | Q. All right. What was that understanding as best you knew?
- 16 **A.** If someone went in there he believed was like a drug
- 17 dealer, when they came out, he could call the storeowner and
- 18 | they would tell him what -- what the individual purchased.
- 19 Q. Right. 'Cause the storeowner doesn't want that stuff
- 20 | happening in his store or her store, does he?
- 21 **A.** No, sir.
- 22 Q. So you could use these types of legal and acceptable,
- 23 | acceptable investigation tactics, right, to continue your
- 24 | investigations to get search warrants and to arrest pretty much
- 25 | people doing bad things in the city; right?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Okay. Now, you had talked about -- and maybe this was
- 3 | when you were in SES. I'm not sure 'cause the notes are
- 4 unclear.
- 5 But when you first started on the sixth floor at the
- 6 Baltimore Police Department headquarters, was that with the
- 7 | Gun Trace Task Force or was that prior?
- 8 A. That was before.
- 9 Q. That was before. Right.
- And some days, as a group, you guys would come in at 8:00
- 11 or 9:00 a.m. and work until 3:00 in the morning; right?
- 12 A. No, I don't ever recall coming in at 8:00 a.m. in the
- 13 morning and staying that late.
- 14 | Q. Okay. So you never told the federal agents that you guys
- 15 | would get there at 8:00 or 9:00 and work until 3:00 a.m. the
- 16 next morning?
- 17 A. I don't recall doing that.
- 18 Q. Do you remember saying that some officers slept in their
- 19 offices or in their cars rather than driving all the way home?
- 20 A. One person did that.
- 21 Q. Do you remember who that was?
- 22 **A.** Sergeant Jenkins.
- 23 **Q.** Right. And, of course, this isn't easy work, is it?
- 24 A. Say it again.
- 25 **Q.** This isn't easy work, is it?

- 1 A. No, sir.
- 2 | Q. Okay. So in the Gun Trace Task Force, the driver of the
- 3 vehicle was Jenkins?
- 4 **A.** Yes.
- 5 Q. Right. And then Detective Taylor sat in the front seat.
- 6 You and your friend Mr. Hendrix are in the back; right?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. Okay. And I think you had said that, you know, Mr. --
- 9 Detective Taylor lacked some of the experience that the other
- 10 guys on the task force had; is that fair to say?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 **Q.** All right. He was the youngest?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. All right. In fact, I believe Jenkins would often fill
- 15 out his, you know, search-and-seizure warrants in his name
- 16 | because he didn't know how to do it?
- 17 A. He would assist him, yes.
- 18 **Q.** Right. Okay. Now, you had testified the other day about
- 19 | this door pop technique.
- 20 Do you remember that?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 Q. Okay. If you could, just explain again what the door pop
- 23 technique was.
- 24 **A.** It was when we pulled up on a crowd of individuals and you
- 25 | would pop the door hard as you could to make it seem like you

- 1 | were aggressively getting out to make someone run.
- 2 Q. Okay. But isn't it true, sir, that when the car would
- 3 | pull up on people, Detective Taylor would pretend like he was
- 4 | talking on the radio?
- 5 A. Sometimes, yes.
- 6 Q. Sometimes; right? Well, because you didn't say that
- 7 | earlier, but I know that's what you had told the federal
- 8 government --
- 9 MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor.
- 10 **THE COURT:** Sustained.
- 11 BY MR. NIETO:
- 12 | Q. Right. So Detective Taylor would pretend that he was
- 13 | talking on the radio sometimes; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 **Q.** And he would call out a description of a person in the
- 16 group and then act like he was acknowledging that he had ID'd
- 17 | that person?
- 18 A. Say it again.
- 19 Q. That's fair enough.
- 20 Detective Taylor would pretend he was talking on the radio
- 21 and would call out a description of a person in the group and
- 22 | then act like he was acknowledging that he had identified that
- 23 person?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 **Q.** Right? That happened?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 Q. Right. And that would give the impression that dispatch
- 3 | had sent you guys looking for someone in particular?
- 4 **A.** Yes.
- 5 | Q. Okay. And then Detective Taylor would start to get out of
- 6 | the car. You guys would see if anybody ran?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. Okay. And so if somebody ran and if they looked like they
- 9 were holding something in their waist that could be a gun, you
- 10 guys would give chase; correct?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. Now, sometimes you guys would approach when you were out
- and about as a group, right, and that was acceptable?
- 14 **A.** Approach, you mean by approach as a group?
- 15 Q. Right. So if you are driving and you see someone who's
- 16 | showing signs of being armed, you guys would get out of the
- 17 | car, the four of you; right? It wasn't all door pops, was it?
- 18 A. No. That's true. Yes.
- 19 Q. Right. Okay. All right.
- 20 So, like I said, maybe someone's holding their side a
- 21 | little more than the other or walking with a decided limp that
- 22 | looks like they're trying to prevent a gun from swinging in
- 23 | their pockets; you know what I'm talking about?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** Okay. So as a police officer, is it your understanding

- 1 | that you were allowed and it's acceptable to use some deception
- 2 during your investigations?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Right. In the same manner in which you were arrested;
- 5 right?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 | Q. They misled you to get you to come to IAD so you could be
- 8 arrested?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. They didn't go to your house. They didn't arrest you at
- 11 | work. They didn't roll up on you when you were on the street;
- 12 | right? They were able to use that subterfuge to apprehend you;
- 13 is that true?
- 14 A. Yes, sir. Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. And that's done lots of times for safety purposes; right?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. And additionally, like, it would be acceptable if you
- 18 | arrest two people in the same car and there's a gun in the
- 19 center console, right, and you bring them back to the satellite
- 20 office for debriefing?
- 21 Are you following me so far?
- 22 A. Yes, I'm following you.
- 23 Q. All right. Now, it would be acceptable for you to go to
- 24 | Suspect A and say, "Suspect B told us all about it. He's
- 25 | puttin' the qun all on you. You better tell us what's really

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- going on. "Right? Even if Suspect B never said that, you can do that; right?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Right? And then that's going to elicit a response from
- 5 | Suspect A, who's going to say, "No, no, no. It's his gun."
- 6 And you can do that back and forth to them to either get
- 7 | incriminating statements or information that's going to help in
- 8 prosecution; isn't that true?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 **Q.** And that's acceptable; correct?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. And you're within your rights to do that as a police
- 13 | officer, aren't you?
- 14 MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor.
- 15 **THE COURT:** I think he's already answered the
- 16 question.
- 17 BY MR. NIETO:
- 18 **Q.** All right. Now, you know through your -- what was that,
- 19 | 13 years of experience, 14 years of experience?
- 20 **A.** 13.
- 21 **Q.** -- 13 years of experience that despite catching somebody
- 22 redhanded with a gun or drugs, they can still say that that
- 23 | didn't happen; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** Right. And so it's, as we've talked about in your direct,

- jail calls are recorded; correct?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. So if someone's locked up and detained, every call they
- 4 | make from the facility, it's all on tape; and you're allowed to
- 5 | listen to them, aren't you?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. In fact, there's a warning before the calls that say, "All
- 8 | calls are monitored and may be listened to"?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. Make sure, legally speaking, they're okay; right?
- 11 **A.** Yes.
- 12 Q. And so it's common in an investigation or prior to a trial
- 13 | for the prosecution or the detectives to listen to jail calls;
- 14 right?
- 15 A. That's something I can't answer. I don't think --
- 16 | everybody doesn't do that.
- 17 **Q.** Right. Not everybody?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. Did you ever do it?
- 20 **A.** Yes.
- 21 Q. Right. Did you see other detectives do it?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 | Q. Are you aware of prosecutors who would ask detectives to
- 24 do it?
- 25 **A.** Yes.

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- 1 Q. Are you aware of prosecutors doing it themselves?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 Q. Right. And so when you listened to these calls, the guys
- 4 on the phone aren't necessarily telling the truth, are they?
- 5 A. Correct.
- 6 Q. Right. They're talking to their girlfriends or to their
- 7 | family members or to their friends, and they're not saying
- 8 | necessarily what you know to be true; is that fair?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Right. Their mom calls; they're not going to tell them
- 11 they got caught with a gun. They're going to say, "The cops
- 12 planted it on me." You've heard that?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 Q. Right? Or they call to their girlfriend, and they're
- 15 going to mislead or try to deflect or not answer or say, "Oh,
- 16 no, they never saw me throw the gun." You've heard that kind
- 17 of stuff; right?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 **Q.** But those would be, obviously, lies; right?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 **Q.** Right.
- 22 All right. So in any given night, I believe you had said
- 23 | that this particular task force could pull up on a slow night
- 24 | 25 different groups of people; right?
- 25 **A.** 20, yes.

- 1 **Q.** 20. Okay.
- 2 And that there might be at least ten foot chases?
- 3 A. Approximately, yes.
- 4 Q. Approximately. On a fast night, maybe even more like 50
- 5 pullups and who knows how many get-out-and-run events; right?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 **Q.** So it is by definition a running-and-gunning-type
- 8 operation?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. All right. And when the task force was able to catch the
- 11 | individuals who were dirty -- I mean, they had drugs or guns on
- 12 | them -- that was usually because of Detective Taylor's speed;
- 13 right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 **Q.** Now, the unit -- did you guys win any awards?
- 16 A. Yes, we got an award.
- 17 | Q. You got an award; right? Again, in October of 2016,
- 18 | right, Lieutenant O'Ree with the ATF Task Force had applauded
- 19 the efforts you guys were making as a group.
- 20 Do you remember that?
- 21 A. I don't think it was O'Ree.
- 22 **Q.** What type of awards had you received?
- 23 | A. I think it was a deputy commissioner's pen we got.
- 24 | Q. Right. Because in 2016, at least in October, your team
- 25 | had made 110 arrests for handqun violations and had seized 132

- 1 | illegal handguns in the city; is that about right?
- 2 A. That sounds about right.
- 3 Q. Those are pretty good numbers, aren't they?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 **Q.** Now, do you remember when the Freddie Gray riots happened?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 **Q.** When was that, sir?
- 8 A. Oh, I remember -- I don't remember the exact month. I'm
- 9 sorry.
- 10 Q. Okay. But you remember the riots; right?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. That was a bad time for Baltimore, wasn't it?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Now, after those riots, Sergeant Jenkins told the
- 15 | commissioner that he was using unlimited overtime and
- 16 | slash days to keep you guys motivated; is that true?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. Right. And at that time, of course, as I said, it was a
- 19 | bad time for Baltimore; right? There was public distrust. The
- 20 police felt, I think, a little overworked and underpaid, maybe
- 21 marginalized; is that fair to say?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 Q. Morale was low, probably lowest you've seen it since you
- 24 | started working there?
- 25 A. All correct, yes.

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- Q. Yeah. And violence is increasing. Murder rate is at almost one death a day in the city.
- 3 Do you remember that?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. Okay. In fact, it was a political nightmare. You had the
- 6 State's Attorney, Ms. Mosby, going on and on about how police
- 7 | are terrible. You have the Police Commissioner try and defend
- 8 the work you're doing.
- 9 **THE COURT:** Sustained.
- 10 BY MR. NIETO:
- 11 Q. You couldn't put a price on keeping those guns off the
- 12 streets, could you?
- MR. WISE: Your Honor --
- 14 **THE COURT:** Sustained.
- 15 **BY MR. NIETO:**
- 16 Q. So after Jenkins told the commissioner about the unlimited
- 17 | overtime and slash days, the commissioner told him to keep the
- 18 | task force working and to do what he had to do; right?
- 19 A. I'm not sure if he said that.
- 20 **Q.** Do you remember Jenkins telling you that?
- 21 A. I remember the conversation, but I'm not exactly sure that
- 22 | that was the ending words of it.
- 23 **Q.** But that was the gist of it?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 Q. Right. Now, Jenkins was the sergeant?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Right. So he's the more senior member of the task force?
- 3 A. He's a supervisor.
- 4 Q. He's a supervisor. Okay. So you had to follow his lead?
- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 Q. All right. If he gave orders or whatever his command is,
- 7 | you were asked to fall in line; right?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 Q. So he was essentially the leader of the group?
- 10 A. Pretty much.
- 11 Q. Right. And so he had the authority, as we discussed, to
- 12 | give you days off if he thought that were appropriate; right?
- 13 A. Yes, he did.
- 14 Q. Right. Okay. So let's go back a little bit, then.
- So it was your testimony this week that you had witnessed
- 16 | Jenkins take drugs during the time he was working and not
- 17 | submit them to Evidence Control; correct?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. And you did nothing to stop it, did you?
- 20 **A.** No, sir.
- 21 **Q.** And you lied in your statements of probable cause; right?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. And you signed reports for Jenkins, but you didn't go to
- 24 | any higher-ups to report what he was doing, did you?
- 25 A. No, I didn't.

- 1 Q. 'Cause you were profiting from it; is that fair to say?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. Both the crimes that you, yourself, were personally
- 4 committing as well as that that Jenkins did; right?
- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 Q. In fact, you and your friend Hendrix had agreed not to
- 7 | tell Jenkins when drugs are recovered.
- 8 Do you remember that?
- 9 **A.** And Taylor also, yes.
- 10 Q. Right. And that was so that you could still submit them
- 11 and write them into the reports without him knowing.
- 12 | A. I would say we were going to submit 'em and write 'em in a
- 13 report.
- 14 | Q. Okay. Now, there was -- I think you had referenced a
- 15 | conversation on the eighth floor of the police department
- 16 between Jenkins and when he was on the phone.
- 17 Do you remember that?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. Now, Detective Taylor wasn't present for that, was he?
- 20 A. No, he wasn't.
- 21 | Q. And so you heard him talk about what seemed like he was
- 22 going to sell the marijuana?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. And then Jenkins came out and saw you?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. Okay. Now, you guys had been working together for some
- 2 | time at that point?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 | Q. All right. He didn't tell you, "Oh, yeah, I'm selling the
- 5 | weed on the side, " did he?
- 6 **A.** No, sir.
- 7 **Q.** All right. Do you remember what he told you?
- 8 **A.** That night, that conversation?
- 9 **Q.** Yeah.
- 10 A. I believe he told me that he gives it to Shawn --
- 11 | Sergeant Edwards on K9 so he can train the dogs.
- 12 **Q.** Okay. So he gave you an explanation that, for all intents
- 13 | and purposes, was probably a lie; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. All right. Okay. Now, you had talked a little bit on
- 16 | your direct about the Belvedere Towers, that marijuana bust.
- 17 Do you remember that?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. And you had said that after the bust, that you had -- with
- 20 the group, you had walked into the woods to split up the money?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 | Q. Right. But there really wasn't a need to get out of the
- 23 | car to do that, was there?
- 24 **A.** I mean, we could have probably, yeah, split the money in
- 25 the car. But --

- 1 Q. Right.
- 2 A. -- it was Jenkins' idea to go back in the woods.
- 3 Q. Go back in the woods, I mean, it seems a bit like
- 4 | overkill, isn't it?
- 5 **A.** It's better safe than sorry.
- 6 Q. So the theory is that it would be safer to leave your
- 7 | phone and vests in a car and then walk into the woods with some
- 8 duffel bags?
- 9 **A.** Yes.
- 10 Q. That was safer than just splitting it up in the car?
- 11 | A. It's not like we in the hunting grounds and we going to
- 12 get shot or something like that. It was woods in a residential
- 13 area.
- 14 Q. Right. But the whole idea was to not -- not to invoke
- 15 | suspicion; correct?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 **Q.** That's why you guys didn't have the vests on?
- 18 | A. Correct.
- 19 **Q.** 'Cause apparently there was a concern that the residents
- 20 | in the area were going to see three or four police officers
- 21 | walking into the woods with duffel bags. You guys didn't want
- 22 that?
- 23 A. Correct.
- 24 | Q. So it's better, I quess, three or four quys to walk into
- 25 | the woods with duffel bags without police vests?

- 1 A. I believe so.
- 2 Q. That's the plan?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. That's the plan?
- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 Q. And the theory of leaving the phones in the car is so that
- 7 | it couldn't be tracked?
- 8 A. That's what he told me, yes.
- 9 Q. Right. But it's not like you walked a mile away from the
- 10 car, did you?
- 11 **A.** No, sir.
- 12 Q. In fact, you could still see the car from where you went?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Right. Okay.
- And you had also said that after the dispersion of the
- 16 | money in the woods, that Jenkins left the bag there?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. Do you know if the bag was ever recovered?
- 19 **A.** No, sir.
- 20 Q. No, you don't know; or, no, it wasn't recovered?
- 21 A. No, it wasn't recovered.
- 22 Q. How do you know it wasn't recovered?
- 23 **A.** That's what I was told; it wasn't recovered.
- 24 **Q.** Who told you that?
- 25 **A.** The agents did a follow-up.

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- 1 Q. Oh, okay. So the agents are providing you information
- 2 about the investigation that's going forward?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Okay. So there's nothing, then, to corroborate the "cash
- 5 | in the woods" story other than your word; right?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 | Q. You also said that, I guess, afterwards you guys went to a
- 8 | strip club; is that right?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Okay. And you thought it would look suspicious to have
- 11 cash in a strip club.
- Do you remember telling the agents that?
- 13 **A.** The amount of money we had, yes.
- 14 Q. The amount of money, not just cash in general?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 | Q. Well, you didn't take any of the cash, did you?
- 17 **A.** No.
- 18 Q. You left it in a bag?
- 19 A. Correct.
- 20 Q. Never touched it again?
- 21 A. Never touched it again.
- 22 | Q. In fact, you just left it with Jenkins?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 Q. So Jenkins, who, according to your testimony, is operating
- 25 on a honor system -- or maybe a dishonor system is probably a

- 4 Q. Right. So it's a stationary vehicle, do you remember?

- 6 Q. And then the gentleman with the backpack gets in the car;
- 7 | right?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 | Q. And then Mr. Stevenson throws the backpack in the back of
- 10 | the car when you guys show up; right?
- 11 **A.** No, that wasn't true.
- 12 Q. No, that wasn't true?
- 13 **A.** That was part of the lie that we put in the probable
- 14 cause, that he threw the backpack.
- 15 **Q.** No throwing of the backpack?
- 16 A. No throwing of the backpack. The backpack was just laying
- 17 | in the back of the minivan.
- 18 **Q.** So it was just the backpack, then?
- 19 **A.** Yes.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. And the windows were tinted; right?
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 | Q. Okay. Because -- my apologies. You had testified earlier
- 23 | this week that you guys would lie about seat belts and tinted
- 24 | windows and that there was no basis for these stops. But in

- 3 | Q. Right. And it was too dark for you to see inside to see
- 4 | the drugs or the money, wasn't it? Right?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. Do you understand what -- I'm sorry. I'm -- my tongue's
- 7 all over the place.
- You had to open the door to be able to see the contraband;
- 9 right?
- 10 A. Yes, I had to open the door to see it, yes; the back door.
- 11 Q. You couldn't see through the windows because they were
- 12 tinted?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Tinted to a point that you couldn't see through them?
- 15 A. No, not visibly. We can see through it. It -- the tint
- 16 | was dark, but we would still see through the vehicle to see who
- 17 was in there.
- 18 Q. Right. You could see who was in there, but you could not
- 19 | see the contraband without opening the door?
- 20 **A.** Oh, no, 'cause it was in the backpack laying on the
- 21 ground. Even if the window was untinted, it was in the
- 22 | backpack; we wouldn't be able to see it.
- 23 **Q.** Wasn't there also a bag of money?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 **Q.** And that was at the foot of the front-seat passenger,

- 1 Mr. Brown?
- 2 A. Yes, but it wasn't recognized that it was money. It was
- 3 still in a container. So unless we had to open the car to go
- 4 in there, physically open up the box to see there was money in
- 5 there, that would be the only way we knew it was money.
- 6 Q. Okay. So you opened the door. Which door did you open?
- 7 **A.** I opened the --
- 8 Q. What door did you open to --
- 9 A. The back door behind the passenger.
- 10 **Q.** Behind the passenger?
- 11 **A.** Yes.
- 12 Q. So the backpack that the passenger had was in the
- 13 | backseat?
- 14 A. No. It was in the front seat.
- 15 Q. But you went through the back door to see it?
- 16 **A.** No. The drugs you're talking about?
- 17 **Q.** What was in the backpack, sir?
- 18 A. It was two backpacks.
- 19 **Q.** Okay.
- 20 **A.** It was a backpack with drugs in it, and it was a backpack
- 21 | with the money in it.
- 22 | Q. Which backpack did Mr. Brown have when he got into the
- 23 | vehicle?
- 24 **A.** The one with the money.
- 25 **Q.** That was in the front seat?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. So you just happened to stumble upon a bag of drugs in the
- 3 backseat?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. And you didn't see the bag getting thrown in the back by
- 6 Mr. Stevenson?
- 7 A. It didn't.
- 8 Q. It didn't happen at all?
- 9 **A.** No, it didn't.
- 10 Q. You -- how do you know it didn't happen at all?
- 11 **A.** Because we discussed the incident before he typed
- 12 everything up, and that was something that Jenkins came up
- 13 with, saying that we saw him throw the backpack in the back.
- 14 Q. Okay. All right. So during your conversation or
- 15 during -- you arrest these gentlemen, right, for the contraband
- 16 | found in the car?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 **Q.** Okay. And Stevenson starts cooperating?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** Right? 'Cause Jenkins wants to find out who his source of
- 21 supply is?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 **Q.** Moving up the chain; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** And Stevenson provides some information?

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- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Right. He also provided information about what he had in
- 3 | his house and where he lived; right?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. But he wasn't telling the truth about where he lived?
- 6 A. Correct.
- 7 Q. Right. So even though he was cooperating, trying to get
- 8 | himself out of trouble, he was still lying to protect
- 9 himself --
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 **Q.** -- right?
- 12 So you guys were able to discern actually where he lives,
- 13 and then you go there; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. And there was a concern that somebody, either
- 16 Mr. Stevenson or someone, was going to alert Mr. Stevenson's
- 17 | family that the police were coming to the house; right?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. And Mr. Stevenson had told you there were going to be
- 20 drugs in the house?
- 21 A. He didn't tell me, no. He spoke to Sergeant Jenkins and
- 22 Hendrix.
- 23 **Q.** Okay. So Hendrix heard him say, "There are drugs, guns,
- 24 | and money in my house"?
- 25 MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor. I think Hendrix has

- 1 to testify to that, not Mr. Ward.
- THE COURT: Well, you'll have to find out whether this
- 3 | witness heard it or not or was told it.
- 4 BY MR. NIETO:
- 5 Q. Did Jenkins or Hendrix tell you about their conversation
- 6 with Mr. Stevenson?
- 7 A. Yes. Jenkins did, yes.
- 8 Q. Okay. And Jenkins told you that that's what Stevenson
- 9 told him, that there were drugs, guns, and money in the house?
- 10 **A.** Yes.
- 11 Q. That's the whole reason why you're going to go there;

- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. If he had told you he had nothing, you may not have gone.
- 15 Right?
- 16 A. We still -- we still would have went.
- 17 | Q. You still would have gone to the house?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. Okay. The real one or the fake one?
- 20 A. Both of 'em.
- 21 | Q. Okay. Now, did you -- did you hear -- did you see any
- 22 | neighbors come out on Jonquil, on that street when you were
- 23 | arresting Mr. Brown and Mr. Stevenson?
- 24 A. Yes. Mr. Brown's baby's mother's family.
- 25 **Q.** All right. And do you remember what they said to you?

- 1 MR. WISE: Your Honor, we're getting into hearsay now,
- 2 what the neighbor said.
- 3 MR. NIETO: Not offered for the truth of the matter,
- 4 | Your Honor. It's for the influence that it had on you.
- 5 BY MR. NIETO:
- 6 Q. Did you hear what she said?
- 7 A. No, I don't remember.
- 8 Q. Do you remember her saying, "I'm going to call
- 9 Mr. Stevenson's family. I'll let your people know you got
- 10 locked up"?
- 11 Do you remember that?
- 12 **A.** Possibly she said that.
- 13 **Q.** Possibly?
- 14 A. Yeah. I don't recall.
- 15 Q. Well, if you don't recall, how is it possible, sir?

Because it's one thing to get caught in a car with the 1 Q. backpack of drugs, but it's something very different to have 2 your house contain kilos and guns; right? 3 MR. WISE: Your Honor, I'm just -- I'd object to the 4 5 form of the question. It's one thing; it's the other. I'm not 6 sure what that means. 7 THE COURT: Well, overruled. If the witness can answer it. 8 9 THE WITNESS: Can you repeat the question, please. BY MR. NIETO: 10 11 Yeah, that's fine. So in terms of the charges that could be placed against 12 13 somebody, right, to be arrested with a bag of drugs in a car, there's charges for that; right? 14 15 Yes, sir.  Jenkins had made up the fact that there was a young man in the

create this exigency to enter the house; is that true?

11 **A.** Yes, sir.

10

- 12 Q. So there was nobody in the backyard?
- 13 **A.** No, sir.
- 14 **Q.** No one?
- 15 **A.** No one.
- 16 MR. NIETO: Court's indulgence.
- 17 BY MR. NIETO:
- 18 Q. And when you met with federal agents on April 19th of
- 19 2017, in attempts to better your situation, you started --
- 20 MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor. An attempt to
- 21 | better his situation? I don't --
- 22 **THE COURT:** Overruled.
- 23 BY MR. NIETO:
- 24 Q. Do you remember meeting with agents on April 19th, 2017?
- 25 A. I believe so, yes.

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- 1 Q. Right. You were there to cooperate?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 **Q.** Why are you cooperating?
- 4 A. Say it one more time.
- 5 **Q.** Why are you cooperating?
- 6 **A.** To try to receive a lesser sentence.
- 7 Q. Okay. So in an attempt to get a lesser sentence, if I'm
- 8 quoting you correctly, you met with agents. And you talked
- 9 about how Detective Taylor called out on the radio that someone
- 10 was running from the back of the house.
- 11 Do you remember telling them that?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. Is that true?
- 14 A. Yes, but it was part -- all of us together, that was the
- 15 hoax that we came up with.
- 16 Q. So when they -- when you told them they weren't able to
- 17 catch the person who ran from the back of the house, that's
- 18 | just -- that was just the lie that had been told and not
- 19 | actually true?
- 20 A. Correct.
- 21 | Q. Okay. And Detective Taylor wasn't sure if the person came
- 22 out of the house --
- 23 | THE COURT: A little slower. A little slower. A
- 24 little slower.
- 25 MR. NIETO: Of course, Your Honor.

BY MR. NIETO: 1 And so you told them Detective Taylor was not sure if the 2 person came out of the house but was a hundred percent sure 3 that they were in the backyard. That was part of the lie too? 4 5 Yes. Α. 6 So Detective Taylor didn't lie and say that the person came out of the house, which would give you 7 exigent circumstances to enter; in part a lie, he's like, Oh, I 8 don't know if he really came from the house. 9 That's what your testimony is? 10 11 A. Yeah. THE COURT: I'm confused. 12 13 MR. WISE: Yeah, I am too, Your Honor. 14 MR. NIETO: I know. I'm sorry, Your Honor. That was 15 terrible. 16 BY MR. NIETO: 17 Okay. So if you know, as part of this ruse or as part of this lie, why would Detective Taylor say he wasn't a hundred 18 19 percent sure this person came from the house? 20 MR. WISE: Your Honor --THE COURT: Sustained. 21

- MR. WISE: Yeah.
- 23 BY MR. NIETO:
- Q. All right. And then Detective Taylor, you told them that
 Detective Taylor estimated the age of the person to be between

- 1 | 18 and 25, and that never happened either?
- 2 A. Say it one more time.
- 3 Q. Detective -- Detective Taylor estimated the age of this
- 4 | fictitious person to be between 18 and 25.
- 5 Do you remember saying that?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 Q. Okay. But that was a fabrication made by Jenkins at the
- 8 | time of the Stevenson search warrant house; right?
- 9 | A. That was all a plan when we first got to the location to
- 10 gain exigent circumstances to go inside the house.
- 11 Q. Okay. So there was nobody, then, in the backyard?
- 12 **A.** No, sir.
- 13 Q. No one's child, no 12- or 15-year-old kid who was in the
- 14 back of the house? None of that?
- 15 **A.** No, sir.
- 16 Q. All right. Now, you had said that you were left alone at
- 17 | the house, right?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. And Jenkins, Hendrix, and Detective Taylor went to get a
- 20 | search warrant.
- 21 Do you remember doing that?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 | Q. All right. And you had said in your testimony that you
- 24 were -- you thought that was odd, and you were concerned that
- 25 | they were going to split up money that they had gotten

- 1 | previously without sharing it with you?
- 2 A. That wasn't my concern about them splitting up the money.
- 3 I just said that it was odd that you usually leave one
- 4 detective at a house to hold the house. You usually -- usually
- 5 leave more than one --
- 6 Q. Right.
- 7 **A.** -- for a big house and that.
- 8 Q. Right. I'm sorry. Maybe I misunderstood you from the
- 9 other day.
- I thought you said, "I thought it was weird they left, and
- 11 I was concerned they were going to split up the money and cut
- 12 me out."
- 13 A. No, that wasn't my exact words, no.
- 14 Q. No, not exact words; but that was what you said, right, or
- 15 no?
- 16 **A.** All that was in the context, but it wasn't -- that wasn't
- 17 how I said it. I was not concerned about the money. I was
- 18 | concerned about being in the house by myself.
- 19 **Q.** Right.
- 20 A. That was my concern.
- 21 **Q.** Right. And you were a little put out because you were the
- 22 | senior member of the group and you're left at the house by
- 23 yourself?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 Q. Right. Okay.

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- And Jenkins said that he wanted to take Detective Taylor
 in order to teach him about writing warrants; right?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Okay. So staying at the house waiting for the warrant by
- 5 | yourself was beneath someone of your stature; is that what
- 6 you're saying?
- 7 A. No, I'm not saying that at all. It's just not safe.
- 8 Q. Okay. 'Cause -- did you tell the agents that you were
- 9 concerned about being there because it was unsafe, or did you
- 10 | tell them you were a little put out because you were the senior
- 11 | member of the group?
- 12 A. No, that wasn't -- it wasn't safe.
- 13 Q. Okay. So isn't it true that Detective Taylor stayed
- 14 upstairs with Mr. Stevenson's girlfriend and/or mother near the
- 15 | living room while the warrant was getting executed?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 | Q. Okay. And it's true that, in fact, he was told by Jenkins
- 18 | to come downstairs because the evidence had been found and they
- 19 | needed him to record it; right?
- 20 **A.** Say that one more time.
- 21 **Q.** Isn't it true that Detective Taylor was, in fact, told by
- 22 | Jenkins to come downstairs to the basement because the evidence
- 23 | was recovered and they needed to videotape it?
- 24 **A.** Which evidence? You talking about the safe or you talking
- 25 | about the drugs?

- 1 Q. All of it.
- 2 **A.** He told everyone to come downstairs.
- 3 Q. Okay. Now, you had -- when you had met with agents
- 4 | previously, you had told them in April of last year that you
- 5 | were the one who recorded the video. Do you remember telling
- 6 them that?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. Okay. And then in a subsequent meeting with them, you
- 9 told them, "I'm not really sure who recorded the video. Could
- 10 have been me. It could have been somebody else."
- 11 Do you remember doing that?
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 | Q. Then you said, "Oh, it was Detective Taylor who did the
- 14 | recording"; correct?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. And that's what you had said the other day; right?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. But you had told federal agents, not once but twice, in
- 19 both the spring and winter of last year, that it was you who
- 20 recorded the video. But that's not true.
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 | Q. I mean, that's -- that's a detail I would think you would
- 23 remember; right? You would remember videotaping the opening of
- 24 | the safe, wouldn't you?
- 25 **A.** It's possible you -- I could forget it, I mean . . .

- 1 Q. I guess it's possible to forget, sir. But you remember
- 2 | the three addresses that Mr. Stevenson gave, right --
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. -- with specifics? You remember that, but you don't
- 5 remember who actually videotaped it?
- 6 A. Correct.
- 7 | Q. Okay. Now, you had testified that after the Stevenson
- 8 incident, everybody went to Detective Taylor's basement and
- 9 | split up the money; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Okay. And you, of course, you threw away your money?
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 | Q. Okay. You tossed it into the woods by your house; is that
- 14 | correct?
- 15 **A.** It's not actually woods. It's like a little path you walk
- 16 through. You cut through the woods, and you go to another
- 17 residential area.
- 18 Q. When you say "we," who do you mean we walked through the
- 19 woods?
- 20 **A.** I say we?
- 21 Q. Was it just you or --
- 22 **A.** Well, I was by myself. I was by myself.
- 23 **Q.** No, no, I understand, sir. But is that path traversed by
- 24 | more than just you? Do other people use it?
- 25 **A.** Yes.

- 1 Q. Are you in an apartment complex, or are you a standalone
- 2 home?
- 3 A. Townhomes.
- 4 Q. Townhomes?
- 5 A. Townhomes, yeah.
- 6 **Q.** So anyone in that area can go up or down that path?
- 7 A. Yeah. It's like a big field you go through; then it's
- 8 like a pathway you cut through the woods, and it leads to
- 9 another residential area.
- 10 Q. Okay. So where did you put the bag, then? Are you on
- 11 | that path or in the woods near it? Where did you put it?
- 12 A. I don't recall what I did with the bag.
- 13 **Q.** You don't recall where you put the bag?
- 14 A. No.
- 15 **Q.** A bag of \$20,000; right?
- 16 A. I didn't -- I dumped the money out of the bag. I didn't
- 17 | toss the whole bag. I dumped the money out of the bag.
- 18 | Q. You just dumped \$20,000 in cash on a path --
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** -- near a wooded area?
- 21 A. It wasn't a wooded area. It was a residential area. I
- 22 | cut through the wooded area.
- 23 **Q.** So \$20,000 just blowing around in the breeze?
- 24 A. Pretty much, yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** Was it wrapped with rubber bands?

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- 1 A. Yes, it was still in rubber bands, yes, the way I received
- 2 | it.
- 3 Q. Oh, so it wouldn't be blowing around in the breeze, then,
- 4 would it?
- 5 A. I mean, it could still blow if the wind is strong enough,
- 6 but I didn't stick around to see.
- 7 Q. So you just took a bag with \$20,000 in cash, dumped it on
- 8 a path, and walked away?
- 9 A. Well, I didn't dump it like that. Kind of chucked it,
- 10 | tossed it, but yes.
- 11 Q. Chucked it?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. And just left?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 **Q.** Did you hear anything else about that money ever?
- 16 **A.** I never did a follow-up on it, no.
- 17 Q. No. Didn't hear anyone in the neighborhood scream like,
- 18 | "Oh, my God, I just found 20 grand in cash"?
- 19 A. No. It's two separate -- two separate areas. So I don't
- 20 really frequent that side of the residential area, so . . .
- 21 Q. Okay. So you didn't keep the money?
- 22 A. No, sir.
- 23 Q. You didn't hide the money?
- 24 A. No, sir.
- 25 **Q.** You just dumped it on a path?

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- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Okay. Now, when Mr. Stevenson went to Circuit Court for
- 3 his motions hearing, you didn't go; right?
- 4 **A.** No, sir.
- 5 **Q.** You said your aunt had passed?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. Did she?
- 8 **A.** No, sir.
- 9 Q. Okay. So you lied about your family member dying so you
- 10 | didn't have to go to court?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. Okay. Let's talk about Raytawn Benjamin.
- Now, Mr. Benjamin, you remember that incident; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. Okay. Now, a gun was recovered; correct?
- 16 A. Yes, sir, a gun was recovered.
- 17 **Q.** Gun wasn't planted?
- 18 **A.** No, sir.
- 19 Q. He was on the streets of the city with a gun; correct?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 Q. Okay. Now, you testified earlier this week that
- 22 Detective Taylor gave you a hundred or \$200 a few minutes after
- 23 the arrest.
- 24 Do you remember saying that?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. Okay. You testified that Detective Taylor searched
- 2 Mr. Benjamin a second time and had taken cash that was never
- 3 submitted?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 | Q. Okay. Now, you knew Mr. Benjamin from before, right, from
- 6 prior interactions?
- 7 A. No, not me, no.
- 8 Q. You didn't know him?
- 9 A. No. Taylor knew him. He's from the Southern District. I
- 10 don't frequent down that area.
- 11 | Q. Okay. So you didn't say to him -- or you didn't call him
- 12 Mr. Benjamin when he was arrested?
- 13 | A. I don't believe so, no. And if I was, I was just probably
- 14 | being respectful calling him Mr. Benjamin.
- 15 Q. I'm sorry. If you --
- 16 **A.** If I called him Mr. Benjamin --
- 17 | Q. If you did call him Mr. Benjamin, it was because you were
- 18 being respectful?
- 19 A. Yes, called him his name, yes.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. Now, when you were again interviewed by the federal
- 21 agents on this case, now it's a little bit later in the year.
- 22 | Now it's March -- I'm sorry, June 14th of 2017 they asked you
- 23 about this incident.
- Do you remember that?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. Okay. And I'm sure you went over it in your trial prep
- 2 sessions last month; correct?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. All right. Now, you told them in June of last year you
- 5 | did not recall money being stolen from Benjamin.
- 6 Do you remember saying that?
- 7 A. Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. Okay. You also told the agents and the federal
- 9 prosecutors that you never received any stolen money from
- 10 Mr. Benjamin?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. But your testimony this week is not that?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. All right. So let's go on to Mr. Whiting. Okay? You had
- 15 | talked a little bit about Mr. Whiting on Tuesday, and you had
- 16 | testified that the amount of money that was stolen was
- 17 | approximately \$10,000; right?
- 18 **A.** Approximately, yes.
- 19 Q. Okay. Now, when we talk approximately, we're not talking
- 20 | about \$23,000, are we?
- 21 **A.** No.
- 22 **Q.** No. We're not talking about \$23,970, are we?
- 23 **A.** No.
- 24 Q. No. We're talking roughly 10 grand?
- 25 A. Approximately.

- 12 | that Gondo and Rayam were criminals, did you?
- 13 **A.** No.
- 14 Q. After -- and I think you had talked a little bit about
- 15 | Ronald Hamilton; right? That was the Westminster
- 16 | search warrant, the one in Carroll County?
- Do you remember that?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 Q. All right. Now, after that warrant was executed, Jenkins
- 20 | told you, Clewell, Hendrix, and Detective Taylor that you guys
- 21 | could go; right?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 11 Q. Now, there was actual overtime put in on the Hamilton
- 12 case; right? I mean, you guys were working late into the
- 13 evening.
- 14 A. Which case was that?
- 15 Q. That's the Carroll County.
- 16 Let me -- did you execute a search warrant at
- 17 Mr. Hamilton's house in Westminster, Carroll County, Maryland,
- 18 during the hours of 8:00 to 4:00 p.m.?
- 19 A. Did I? No, I didn't.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. Between 9:00 and 5:00?
- 21 | **A.** No, I didn't.
- 22 **Q.** No. It was dark out; right? It was nighttime?
- 23 **A.** I didn't execute a warrant in Westminster.
- 24 | Q. Okay. Now, overtime sheets are submitted when people do
- 25 | work overtime; right?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Okay. And there's often -- when you submit your overtime
- 3 | sheets, it's not as if you get paid for that overtime the next
- 4 day; right?
- 5 A. Correct.
- 6 Q. It's got to get processed, and it can take a couple of
- 7 | weeks for that to be reflected in your paycheck; right?
- 8 A. No. As long as you get it in a timely manner, it's like a
- 9 deadline. It should be on your check. If you get it on the
- 10 day after, then it would take a couple of weeks.
- 11 **Q.** Okay. So it can take a couple weeks, depending on when
- 12 | they're submitted?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 Q. Okay. So, for example, you could work overtime the first
- 15 | week of January; but depending on when it's submitted, your
- 16 paycheck may not reflect that until the end of January or maybe
- 17 | even the beginning of February; right?
- 18 A. That's correct.
- 19 Q. Okay. Now, you told agents that you never worked a full
- 20 shift.
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 | Q. Okay. Now, Jenkins was responsible for determining
- 23 | overtime; right? And he would dictate the hours that you guys
- 24 | would work?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. And he instituted slash days in the unit.
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. Now, he was your supervisor. He was the sergeant. He was
- 4 running the show.
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And Jenkins told you and everyone that if they got a
- 7 | certain number of guns off the street, you get a day off as a
- 8 reward; right?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And that was the order from your supervisor?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. In fact, as we had talked about, Jenkins had told the
- 13 | commissioner about how he kept you guys motivated; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. And as you said, I think on Tuesday you said Jenkins was
- 16 in control of all that. Do you remember saying that?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. Now, Jenkins would routinely twist stories around; is that
- 19 | fair to say?
- 20 **A.** True.
- 21 **Q.** Right. So he'd tell you one thing but then maybe tell
- 22 | Hendrix something else?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 Q. Right?
- 25 And he was convincing the way he did it?

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- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. And that's -- for example, that K9 example, right, he just
- 3 | sort of came right out with the K9 example. I was talking with
- 4 | Sergeant Edwards about that, but you didn't think that was
- 5 true; right?
- 6 A. Correct.
- 7 Q. But it's a pretty good response being caught coming right
- 8 | out of the office; right?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Now, Jenkins didn't tell you or the squad everything he
- 11 was doing.
- 12 **A.** No, sir.
- 13 Q. And he would lie to other officers about what he was
- 14 | doing; right?
- 15 A. I don't know if I can answer that. I'm not sure.
- 16 Q. Okay. He told people what he thought they needed to know.
- 17 | He would talk to you and tell you things that he thought you
- 18 | needed to know; right?
- 19 **A.** Yes.
- 20 **Q.** Now, on Tuesday the Government had presented to you a
- 21 | duffel bag, and you had identified that positively as the
- 22 | duffel bag that you had seen in Jenkins' van. Do you remember
- 23 that?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 Q. Okay. Now, were there one or two bags in his van?

- 1 | A. It was two.
- 2 | Q. There were two.
- And the two bags that you saw, were those -- were those
- 4 | specifically those bags?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. Okay. Now, when he needed to access one of those bags to
- 7 | get into, I think you said it might have been
- 8 Detective Taylor's car, did he open up both bags or just the
- 9 one that had the pry bar?
- 10 A. Both of 'em.
- 11 Q. He opened up both?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 | Q. Okay. And you were able to see all of the contents
- 14 | contained within it?
- 15 A. Most of it, yes.
- 16 | Q. Okay. Did you -- did it have a police vest in the bag?
- 17 **A.** At the time, no.
- 18 | Q. Well, do you know why there was a police vest, then, in
- 19 | the bag on Tuesday?
- 20 **A.** That must have been in there, I quess, when they were
- 21 seized.
- 22 Q. So when you saw it and you said, Yeah, this is the stuff
- 23 | that I saw, that vest wasn't in there?
- 24 **A.** The day -- no.
- 25 Q. No. Okay. Now, Paul Jones, we talked a little bit about

- 1 | him today. Remember that case?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. Okay. Now, you never discussed with the federal agent or
- 4 | the prosecutors anything about that case until November 8th;
- 5 | right?
- 6 A. If that's the date on the paper. I'm not good with --
- 7 | Q. You had met with agents for about six months, and you
- 8 never brought this case up, did you?
- 9 **A.** No.
- 10 Q. They brought it to you?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. And they started asking you about it?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. And then you remembered it, and you started talking to
- 15 | them about it; right?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 Q. Okay. So take me back.
- 18 Was any money taken from Mr. Jones?
- 19 A. To my knowledge, no.
- 20 **Q.** No. And you would know because you submitted money in
- 21 | that case; right?
- 22 **A.** I don't think I submitted the money that day.
- 23 **Q.** You remember recovering money from the house?
- 24 **A.** I probably recovered money, but doesn't mean I'm the one
- 25 | that submitted it.

- Q. Well, surely in your preparations, you guys -- you and the agents talked about the Jones situation, didn't you?

 A. Yes.

 Q. Right?
- And they showed you some paperwork about the case?
- 6 A. Incident report, yes.
- 7 Q. Incident report. All right.
- 8 And did you see like the search-and-seizure warrant and
- 9 the return?
- 10 A. No. I just saw the incident report.
- 11 Q. Ah, okay. So they didn't really prep you for this, did
- 12 they?
- 13 MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor.
- 14 **THE COURT:** Sustained.
- 15 **BY MR. NIETO:**
- 16 Q. So you -- you remember recovering and submitting \$233
- taken from the master bedroom of that search-warranted house?
- 18 A. I don't remember submitting it. I remember recovering it.
- 19 Q. Oh, so you did recover money from the house now. You
- 20 remember that?
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 THE COURT: That's what he said before.
- 23 MR. NIETO: Right.
- 24 BY MR. NIETO:
- 25 Q. But you don't remember the amount?

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- 1 A. No, I don't.
- 2 Q. You didn't take any money from him?
- 3 A. No, I didn't.
- 4 Q. Okay. Now, you had said that you had determined that the
- 5 | trash was pulled from a -- the wrong area?
- 6 A. The wrong house, yes.
- 7 **Q.** How did you figure that out?
- 8 A. We did, I guess, pre -- pre -- pre-raid. We went through
- 9 the area before we obtained the warrant and all that.
- 10 Q. Well, you're the one who pulled the trash; right?
- 11 **A.** Me and Taylor.
- 12 Q. Right. Who got the trash can?
- 13 **A.** I don't know exactly who -- who pulled the trash.
- 14 | Q. Okay. Where was the trash pulled from?
- 15 **A.** The house number, you're asking me?
- 16 **Q.** Yeah.
- 17 A. I don't know what house number it was pulled from, but it
- 18 | wasn't Mr. Jones' house.
- 19 Q. How do you know it wasn't his house?
- 20 **A.** Because when we went through there later on in the
- 21 | daytime, we found his house.
- 22 Q. I'm a little confused.
- Did you know his house before the trash run was done? Did
- 24 you know the address?
- 25 A. Yes, we did.

- 1 Q. Okay. And it's got an alley in the back; right?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 | Q. And the houses are up on a little bit of a hill; correct?
- 4 **A.** Yes.
- 5 Q. I know you remember this, don't you?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 Q. Okay. So there's fenced-in backyards; correct?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 **Q.** And they're numbered and labeled.
- 10 A. Not all of 'em.
- 11 Q. Not all of 'em.
- 12 So where did you find this trash can that you thought
- 13 belonged to that house?
- 14 A. In the -- it was at the wrong house. It wasn't Mr. Jones'
- 15 address.
- 16 Q. On the same block? In the same city? In the same state?
- 17 | Where did you find it, sir?
- 18 A. In the same block, sir.
- 19 **Q.** On the same block. In that alley?
- 20 **A.** Yes.
- 21 | Q. Now, you had said you saw Mr. Jones or, as you called him,
- 22 Pedro -- right? Where did you get that name from?
- 23 **A.** I knew it. Somebody told me that information.
- 24 Q. Okay. A confidential informant?
- 25 **A.** You could say that, yes, a source.

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- 1 Q. A source. Okay.
- 2 So they had provided you information about this individual
- 3 | selling drugs on that block, and that's why you went there;
- 4 right?
- 5 **A.** No, they didn't -- they didn't provide me information with
- 6 it. I witnessed with my own eyes.
- 7 **Q.** So what were you doing there?
- 8 A. I was meetin' somebody.
- 9 **Q.** Who?
- 10 A. A friend.
- 11 **Q.** Who?
- 12 A. A friend who used to work for the police department.
- 13 **Q.** Who?
- 14 A. A Detective Young.
- 15 Q. Okay. So while you were there meeting Detective Young,
- 16 | what were you doing meeting Detective Young there?
- 17 A. He was a friend, so I was just meeting there to talk to
- 18 him.
- 19 Q. Just a social visit?
- 20 A. Social visit, yes.
- 21 **Q.** Did he live there?
- 22 **A.** No. His father lived there in the block.
- 23 Q. On the block. Okay.
- 24 And so you had seen -- let me put it this way, all right:
- 25 | So did the confidential source explain to you that Pedro is not

- 1 | a small-time dealer?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 Q. Okay. And that he only deals with exclusive clientele in
- 4 | which they call and order up what they want to be purchased by
- 5 | phone and meet at a location, usually on Collins Ave.?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 **Q.** Okay. And that's true?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 Q. And you were able to use the database to positively
- 10 | identify him as Mr. Jones.
- 11 Do you remember doing that?
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 **Q.** Okay. Now, armed with this information, you set up to
- 14 | monitor that area; is that true?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. Okay. And that's why you were there on this social
- 17 occasion with this other detective, and you were able to see
- 18 | him make hand-to-hand transactions; right?
- 19 A. No. I think you're going at it backwards. The whole
- 20 thing --
- 21 **Q.** Okay. Take me through it, then.
- 22 | A. The whole thing started because I went to go visit this
- 23 | other detective. That's when I observed hand-to-hand
- 24 | transactions by Mr. Jones. That led me to go into the
- 25 investigation.

- 1 Q. So you did see the hand-to-hands then?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 | Q. But you didn't put that in the search warrant?
- 4 A. I'm not sure. I don't have the search warrant in front of
- 5 me.
- 6 Q. Do you remember putting it in the search warrant?
- 7 A. I can't recall.
- 8 Q. It would be an important piece of information to put in
- 9 there, don't you think?
- 10 **A.** Yes.
- 11 Q. Right. In your experience, it would help establish he's a
- 12 drug dealer; right?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. That's something that the Court would want to know if
- 15 | they're going to authorize you to enter his house; right?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. Okay. Have you had a chance to look at the search warrant
- 18 at all?
- 19 **A.** No, sir.
- 20 **Q.** Okay. Did you see it before it was submitted?
- 21 **A.** No, sir.
- 22 Q. Okay. Okay. So after you saw Jones selling drugs, that's
- 23 | when you started up this investigation. And you were able to
- 24 | identify his address as -- well, you might remember the
- 25 address. Do you remember the address?

- 1 A. I believe it was 32 Upmanor.
- 2 Q. Precisely right. Do you remember that from your own
- 3 recollection or because they told you?
- 4 A. My own recollection.
- 5 Q. Okay. So you remember that address. But you don't
- 6 remember where you got the trash, do you?
- 7 **A.** No.
- 8 Q. Okay. So you had been to that house?
- 9 **A.** To pull the trash?
- 10 Q. No, no, no. As part of your investigation; right? I
- 11 mean, you were there. Did you -- did you go to that house to
- 12 | surveil it?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 Q. Okay. And it's sort of at the corner of the block, right?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 | Q. So it's actually sort of like this -- it kind of looks
- 17 like a Franken-house. It's kind of split in half. One is one
- 18 | color, and the other one is a different color.
- 19 Do you know what I'm talking about?
- 20 A. I don't remember the color of the house.
- 21 Q. You don't remember the color of the house?
- 22 **A.** No.
- 23 | Q. But in the back in the alley, that is where the trash
- 24 | would be recovered; correct?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

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- 1 Q. Now, was it out for pickup, or did you pull it out of the
- 2 backyard?
- 3 **A.** Took it out of the backyard.
- 4 Q. Was it up against the fence, or did you have to enter into
- 5 | the property to get it?
- 6 **A.** You have to reach over into the property to get it.
- 7 | Q. But you were able just to reach over and pull it out?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 Q. Okay. But you're convinced it's the wrong house?
- 10 **A.** Yes.
- 11 Q. But you can't remember the address from where you pulled
- 12 it, can you?
- 13 **A.** No, sir.
- 14 Q. All right. Now, when you searched the house, do you
- 15 remember what you guys recovered?
- 16 A. Not exactly. I know it was some handguns, drugs.
- 17 | Q. Right. And do you remember Mr. Jones making any
- 18 | statements?
- 19 A. No, I don't remember.
- 20 Q. Well, do you remember talking about this incident with the
- 21 | agents and remembering these things or no?
- 22 **A.** Say it one more time.
- 23 **Q.** That's fine. That's fine.
- Okay. So you had told the agents on November 8th, 2017,
- 25 | that you didn't take any money during the incident?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 Q. And you don't remember money being seized?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. Right. But you very well could have seized money, but you
- 5 | just don't recall?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. All right. But you remember that Mr. Jones complained
- 8 | that he didn't have a chance to fire the guns that had been
- 9 seized that day?
- 10 A. I remember that now, I recall.
- 11 Q. You remember that; right?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 | Q. Do you remember him complaining about any money having
- 14 been taken?
- 15 **A.** No.
- 16 **Q.** No.
- 17 MR. NIETO: Court's indulgence.
- 18 BY MR. NIETO:
- 19 **Q.** Okay. Do you know Ivan Potts?
- 20 **A.** Ivan Potts, yes, I'm familiar with it, yes.
- 21 | Q. How are you familiar with Mr. Potts?
- 22 **A.** It was an arrest we made.
- 23 **Q.** I'm sorry?
- 24 A. An arrest.
- 25 Q. Right. He's suing you; right?

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- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. Okay. So he's suing you for \$1.5 million for an illegal
- 3 arrest; correct?
- 4 A. I'm not sure of the amount.
- 5 **Q.** Okay. And you have an attorney, and you've spoke to him
- 6 about that?
- 7 A. Not yet, no.
- 8 Q. Okay. And so are you aware of the allegations placed
- 9 | against you?
- 10 **A.** Yes.
- 11 Q. Okay. So did you use excessive force with Mr. Potts?
- 12 **A.** No, sir.
- 13 **Q.** Did you hit him with a baton in any way?
- 14 A. No, sir.
- 15 **Q.** Did anyone plant a gun on him?
- 16 **A.** No, sir.
- 17 **Q.** Now, it was you, Hendrix, and Jenkins; right?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 | Q. Okay. So in that particular instance, nothing was done
- 20 wrong?
- 21 A. Correct.
- 22 Q. Okay. So Mr. Potts is just trying to, what, take
- 23 | advantage of the situation?
- MR. WISE: Objection, Your Honor.
- 25 **THE COURT:** Sustained.

1 BY MR. NIETO:

- 2 Q. Have you been sued by other individuals based on your
- 3 involvement in the Gun Trace Task Force?
- 4 A. To my knowledge, no.
- 5 | Q. Have other people been coming, trying to get out from
- 6 underneath convictions because you were involved in the
- 7 | arrests, if you know?
- 8 A. That I know of, no.
- 9 Q. Okay. So you became a police officer in 2003?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. So for the past 13 or 14 years, how many years would you
- 12 | say that you were a professional liar?
- 13 MR. WISE: Your Honor, I'm just going to -- I'm going
- 14 to object to the "professional liar."
- 15 **THE COURT:** Sustained.
- 16 MR. NIETO: I'm sorry. That was poor.
- 17 BY MR. NIETO:
- 18 Q. Okay. So, sir, you spent one year in the
- 19 District Stabilization Unit; right?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 Q. And then three or four years with the Western District
- 22 patrol, sort of on the streets; right?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. And you weren't stealing or lying or submitting false
- 25 | affidavits or perjuring yourself or doing anything during that

Yes, sir. 8 Α. And you lied to your family; right? 9 10 Yes, sir. A. 11 And you've sort of tacitly lied to the police department by not informing them about what Jenkins was doing? 12 13 Α. Yes, sir. 14 Q. Okay. 15 Nothing further, Your Honor. MR. NIETO: 16 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. 17 Mr. Purpura? 18 MR. PURPURA: Thank you, Your Honor. 19 CROSS-EXAMINATION 20 BY MR. PURPURA: 21 Mr. Ward, good afternoon, sir. 22 Good afternoon, sir. Α. 23 Mr. Ward, what seems like a long time ago Mr. Wise was 24 asking you questions this morning, and he started with 25 Paul Jones.

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- 1 Do you remember that?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And that was -- who was the affiant on that warrant?
- 4 A. Detective Taylor.
- 5 | Q. And you -- and according to your testimony, you and
- 6 | both -- Detective Taylor came to the realization that this was
- 7 | the wrong trash pull; it was not related to that house; is that
- 8 | correct?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And so the proper procedure would have been to go back and
- 11 rewrite a warrant and see if there's sufficient probable cause
- 12 | and present it to a judge; is that correct?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 **Q.** But that's not what happened; is that correct?
- 15 **A.** That's correct.
- 16 Q. But according to you, you both knew that there was
- 17 | information which was probably not accurate in that warrant at
- 18 | that time; is that correct, sir?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** But you didn't steal any money; you didn't take any money;
- 21 and that was not your intent when you went in that house; is
- 22 | that correct, sir?
- 23 **A.** That's correct.
- 24 | Q. Your intent to go in that house was to take guns and drugs
- 25 off the streets; is that correct, sir?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. And that's what you did on that particular day; is that
- 3 correct?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 **Q.** Mr. Wise also asked you this morning about the -- were you
- 6 | forewarned about the coverup? Do you remember those questions?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. And you received information from Detective or
- 9 | Sergeant Jenkins; is that correct?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. And present with you, I think, was two other police
- officers, but not Mr. Hersl (indicating); is that correct, sir?
- 13 **A.** That is correct.
- 14 Q. And there was a second time you received information about
- 15 | there was a possible federal investigation. You received other
- 16 | information about that; is that correct, sir?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 **Q.** And when you received that information, Mr. Hersl wasn't
- 19 | with you at that time either, was he, sir?
- 20 **A.** No, sir.
- 21 Q. There were some questions on Tuesday when Mr. Wise had
- 22 | that duffel bag out here. Do you remember that duffel bag
- 23 being out here?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** He had the -- looked like hockey masks which were black

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- and crowbars and all sorts of things in that duffel bag; right?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 | Q. And it appeared to you that it really wasn't police-type
- 4 | instruments in that duffel bag; right, sir?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. As a matter of fact, it appeared to you like it would be
- 7 | instruments used more like for home invasions rather than
- 8 police work; is that correct, sir?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Who was present with you when detective -- strike that,
- 11 | Sergeant Jenkins showed you that duffel bag?
- 12 A. It was myself, Hendrix, and Taylor.
- 13 Q. Not Mr. Hersl (indicating); is that correct, sir?
- 14 A. No, sir, he wasn't there.
- 15 **Q.** You were asked some questions about -- just a couple
- 16 | minutes ago about a Westminster search. You were not part of
- 17 | the Westminster search, were you, sir?
- 18 **A.** No, sir.
- 19 Q. As a matter of fact, your team was split up for that
- 20 particular investigation; is that correct, sir?
- 21 | A. Yes, sir.
- 22 Q. Detectives Rayam, Gondo, Hersl, and Sergeant Jenkins went
- 23 | out to Carroll County in Westminster; is that correct, sir?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 | Q. And you, along with Hendrix and others, including

- 1 Detective John Clewell, went and executed a search warrant here
- 2 | in Baltimore City which was related; is that correct, sir?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 | Q. And that was all part of a larger investigation involving
- 5 | this somewhat major drug trafficker, Ronald Hamilton; is that
- 6 | correct, sir?
- 7 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. And this wasn't just a spur-of-the-moment investigation,
- 9 was it?
- 10 A. It wasn't my investigation. I wasn't fully involved in it
- 11 | so I don't know.
- 12 Q. Fair enough. Your involvement was just the
- 13 | search warrants on the -- July 8th, is that correct, sir, of
- 14 | 2016?
- 15 **A.** If that's the date, yes.
- 16 **Q.** Thank you.
- 17 You started in the Western District; is that correct?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. I'm now going to show you what has been marked as
- 20 Defense Exhibit No. 1.
- 21 Let me get it on the screen a little bit.
- 22 And thanks to Google, we've pinpointed where the
- 23 | Western District is in Baltimore City; is that correct, sir?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 THE COURT: Just to -- it's not on my monitor. Is it

- 1 on everybody else's?
- 2 MR. PURPURA: This monitor is not working either.
- 3 BY MR. PURPURA:
- 4 | Q. Anyway, so this is Western District; is that correct, sir?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And you were working at Western District for approximately
- 7 | five years, according to your testimony; is that right?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. And all around the Western District, all around the
- 10 Western District, from the Lexington Terrace area to
- 11 Pennsylvania Avenue to North Avenue, that's all what's
- 12 | considered to be high-crime area; isn't that correct, sir?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. As a matter of fact, it's -- I think maybe before your
- 15 | time, but was it at a time that Western District was referred
- 16 to as Fort Apache?
- 17 A. I'm not sure about that.
- 18 **Q.** And, anyway, so there's a huge amount of crime in
- 19 | Baltimore City, a large amount, right surrounding your police
- 20 | station in Western District; is that correct, sir?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 | Q. It's a very busy district; is that correct, sir?
- 23 | **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 Q. And there's another district literally on the east side --
- 25 | that's the west side -- and that's Eastern District, and you

- 1 also worked there. This is Defense Exhibit No. 2.
- Is that correct, sir?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 | Q. And the Eastern District is also another busy narcotics,
- 5 guns, and murder district; is that correct, sir?
- 6 A. That's correct, yes.
- 7 | Q. And that's also where you were part of working; is that
- 8 | correct, sir?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And during that time, you did a job and you did your job
- 11 | well; is that fair to say, sir?
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 | Q. And because you were doing your job so well, there came a
- 14 | time in 2015 when Sergeant Wayne Jenkins --
- 15 | Government Exhibit FBI-3 -- that man there, as your sergeant,
- 16 he contacted you; is that correct, sir?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. And you didn't really know him that well before the spring
- 19 of 2015, did you?
- 20 **A.** No.
- 21 **Q.** And he said he was looking for some hard workers; correct?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 **Q.** And you were a hard worker; right?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 **Q.** You came from those busy districts, and you did your job;

1 correct?

- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And the time period when Jenkins came to you and asked you
- 4 to come in as a hard worker, that was the spring of 2015;
- 5 correct?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. And we know what happened here in Baltimore City in the
- 8 | spring of 2015. That was the death of Freddie Gray; right?
- 9 A. I believe so, sir, yes.
- 10 **Q.** And there were riots after that; right?
- 11 **A.** There was riots, yes.
- 12 Q. And you're familiar what happened to the Western District
- and the Eastern District about the murder rate in 2015; is that
- 14 | correct, sir?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 | Q. Blew up; right?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. The largest ever in Baltimore City's history; is that
- 19 | correct, sir?
- 20 **A.** I'm not sure of the numbers, but it was an increase.
- 21 Q. And you were, as a police officer, you were aware. And it
- 22 was pressure on you and your fellow officers to do something;
- 23 correct?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 Q. But what really happened during that time? Is it fair to

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- 1 | say that a lot of officers on the west side, on the east side
- 2 after the Freddie Gray incident said, "I don't want to get
- 3 involved"? Is that fair to say?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 **Q.** So there were a lot fewer arrests by a lot of officers out
- 6 | there, isn't that correct, sir, during that time period?
- 7 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. And the mandate of your SES, Special Enforcement Section,
- 9 back in 2015, 2016 -- 2015 and the GTTF starting in 2016 was to
- 10 get the guns off the street; right?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. And that wasn't just in the Western District or the
- 13 | Eastern District or South Baltimore or North Baltimore. You
- 14 | had citywide jurisdiction; correct?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 **Q.** And there was a lot of pressure on you and your fellow
- 17 officers to do exactly what you were mandated to do; is that
- 18 | correct, sir?
- 19 A. I wouldn't say -- I didn't really feel the pressure,
- 20 so . . .
- 21 Q. You didn't feel the pressure?
- 22 **A.** No.
- 23 | Q. But you were out there doing like what you said, 20 to 25
- 24 or more attempted stops every night, day in and day out when
- 25 | you were working; is that correct, sir?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 Q. And you were ripping and roaring; right?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. And that's what Jenkins liked to do. He never got tired;
- 5 right?
- 6 A. Absolutely.
- 7 **Q.** This man here never got tired; right?
- 8 A. Right.
- 9 Q. And he kept ripping and roaring, and you and the other
- 10 GTTF members tried to keep up with him doing the same thing on
- 11 | the east side and the west side of Baltimore City; isn't that
- 12 | correct, sir?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. As to the overtime, now, that concept of overtime to you,
- 15 | that didn't commence when you came onto the GTTF, did it, sir?
- 16 | A. I'm not understanding. What's the question?
- 17 Q. Getting overtime for guns, excuse me, getting bonus
- 18 overtime, getting overtime for good work, that was something
- 19 | you knew about before you came to GTTF; is that correct, sir?
- 20 **A.** It had happened before, yes.
- 21 **Q.** As a matter of fact, that's one of the things that the
- 22 Government questioned you about; right?
- 23 **A.** Yes.
- 24 Q. And if I tell you, your first proffer was April 19th of
- 25 2017. And your second proffer was about a week or two later,

- 1 April 28th of 2017. Does that sound about right to you, sir?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And when I say "proffer," that's when you sat down with
- 4 Government counsel (indicating), right, Mr. Wise,
- 5 Mr. Hendrix [sic]; correct?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 Q. You also sat down with FBI Agent Jensen at the front desk;
- 8 is that correct?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And others may have been present as well, including your
- 11 | attorney (indicating); is that correct?
- 12 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 13 Q. And these proffers, Detective-- excuse me, Agent Jensen
- 14 | was taking notes; right?
- 15 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. And you spoke sometimes for an hour or two hours or maybe
- 17 | even three hours during these sessions; is that correct, sir?
- 18 A. That's correct.
- 19 **Q.** And in particular on April 28th, 2017, Mr. Wise and others
- 20 directed your attention to overtime and what's going on about
- 21 | overtime which may not be proper overtime.
- Do you remember that?
- 23 **A.** Yes.
- 24 Q. And you told them that the first time you heard about the
- 25 | concept of getting overtime for guns or overtime for good work

- 1 | was from a Hans Nicolas; is that right?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. He was a sergeant with the SES at that time; is that
- 4 | correct, sir?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And there were complaints that this particular sergeant
- 7 | wasn't giving overtime for guns and drugs; right?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. And then you learned -- and this is before Jenkins; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. And then you learned, I believe you indicated to this
- 12 group of Government officials here (indicating), that there was
- a Lieutenant Dombroski, D-E-M-B-R-O-K-S [sic]; right?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. And that he gave eight hours of overtime or slash days for
- 16 | a gun; right?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 **Q.** And that was an accepted procedure; correct?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** Even though you actually didn't work it; right?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 **Q.** But because during this time period when the murder rate
- 23 was blowing up and there was havoc, you had a gun or two guns,
- 24 | you get a reward and that's a slash day; correct?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. And it was also during this period there was a limit or
- 2 there was a budget issue for overtime.
- 3 Do you remember that?
- 4 **A.** Yes, I do.
- 5 Q. That overtime was limited; correct?
- 6 **A.** Yes.
- 7 Q. But it was not limited to your group; is that correct,
- 8 sir?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. And that's because your group was out there proactively
- 11 doing what they should have been doing at that point, getting
- 12 guns off the street during a time of crisis; is that correct,
- 13 | sir?
- 14 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 15 Q. And we heard already that you got rewarded for it, that
- 16 Deputy Commission Palmere gave your group and the others
- 17 | working with you getting these guns off the street an award;
- 18 right?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 Q. And Jenkins basically says, "Gentlemen, your work speaks
- 21 | for itself." That was your defense; right?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 **Q.** Now, on Tuesday the Government showed you some overtime
- 24 slips.
- Do you remember that?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. And they were your overtime slips; right?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 Q. Government Exhibit PP -- it's 2E, 2E, putting back on the
- 5 | screen, this was one of the overtime slips that Mr. Wise went
- 6 over with you; is that correct, sir?
- 7 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. And when you were on the witness stand, that wasn't the
- 9 | first time you saw that slip because in one of those proffer
- 10 sessions and/or one of the prep sessions, Mr. Wise showed you
- 11 | that slip and said he was going to be asking you questions
- 12 | about that; is that correct?
- 13 A. I'm not sure. I don't . . .
- 14 | Q. Well, did -- you indicated that you filed some overtime
- 15 | slips for Mr. Hersl; is that correct?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 | Q. Did Mr. Wise ever show you those slips?
- 18 **A.** No.
- 19 Q. So all this -- how many slips did they show you?
- 20 A. I'm not sure.
- 21 Q. But out of all the slips they showed you, they never
- 22 | showed you one slip that you could identify that you actually
- 23 | filed for Mr. Hersl (indicating); is that correct?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 (Counsel conferred.)

BY MR. PURPURA:

- 2 Q. Now, also, do you remember hearing a phone conversation
- 3 | that was played -- Mr. Wise played between yourself and
- 4 Mr. Gondo?

1

- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 Q. And you were asked some questions about that.
- 7 Do you remember that?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. Well, I'm going to put on the screen, if I may, which
- 10 | would be FBI-9, which is the transcript, and I'm going to turn
- 11 to Page 2 of that.
- Now, I don't believe Mr. Wise directed your attention to
- 13 | this section of the conversation. But you're saying
- 14 [reading]: And depend on how he feel, we roll out regular time
- or but he'll try to make you see, see if you want to make
- 16 overtime every day, yo. That's how he is, yo. And then we
- 17 | just got the green light, seen O'Ree last night, said the
- 18 | overtime budget has opened back up. Work as much as you want.
- 19 Right?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 | Q. Now, who is O'Ree?
- 22 A. He was our lieutenant for a time.
- 23 | Q. And O'Ree indicated that your budget now on overtime was
- 24 | wide open again; is that correct?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

- 1 Q. And this was June 14th of 2016; is that correct, sir?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And that's when you were at the GTTF; is that correct,
- 4 sir?
- 5 A. I believe so, yes, sir.
- 6 Q. And that's when you were receiving overtime for guns
- 7 | and/or slash days for guns; is that correct, sir?
- 8 A. Say the question one more time.
- 9 Q. At this point in June 2016, when the overtime was opened
- 10 back up by Lieutenant O'Ree, you all were receiving slash days
- 11 or four hours per gun; is that correct, sir?
- 12 A. We were receiving slash days and extra overtime; but it
- wasn't a number like if we got one gun, it was four hours.
- 14 Q. Right. It just depended; fair enough?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 Q. The Shawn Whiting incident, I believe that's January of
- 17 | 2014; is that about right?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 | Q. Did you write the search warrant for that?
- 20 **A.** Yes, I did.
- 21 **Q.** So you're what's called the affiant on that incident; is
- 22 | that correct, sir?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. And was it your intent when you wrote that search warrant
- 25 | to be honest and truthful to either the District Court judge or

- 1 | a Circuit Court judge who that warrant was presented to?
- 2 A. Yes, sir.
- 3 Q. And it was your intent -- when you wrote that
- 4 | search warrant, was it your intent to do a proper and lawful
- 5 | search of the premises of Mr. Whiting?
- 6 A. What do you mean by a "proper" and --
- 7 | Q. Was it your intent to steal, or was it your intent to get
- 8 drugs and guns off the street?
- 9 **A.** 50/50, I would say.
- 10 Q. So at that point, when you wrote that, when you wrote that
- 11 | with Shawn Whiting, it was in your mind that I'm going to go
- 12 | into this house; correct?
- 13 **A.** Uh-huh.
- 14 Q. And I'm going to get guns, get drugs; and if he's got
- 15 | money, I'm going to steal at that point. Correct?
- 16 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 17 | Q. So you had a criminal intent at the very beginning of that
- 18 | incident; is that correct, sir?
- 19 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 20 **Q.** And that criminal intent was shared with some police
- 21 officers' intent as well that you were going to try to do the
- 22 | right thing; right?
- 23 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 24 | Q. But you clearly were a criminal on that incident; is that
- 25 correct, sir?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 Q. And when you intended to take that money that you found,
- 3 you used force to get that money; isn't that correct, sir?
- 4 | **A.** Yes, sir.
- 5 **Q.** And you know that's wrong; right?
- 6 A. Absolutely.
- 7 **Q.** But that was your intent from the beginning; correct?
- 8 A. Yes, sir.
- 9 Q. Because you wanted to take money; right?
- 10 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 11 Q. Belvedere Towers, Defense Hersl 3.
- Does that look like the Belvedere Towers, sir, we're
- 13 | talking about, spring 2015?
- 14 | A. Yes, that's the Belvedere Towers, yes.
- 15 Q. And this is the incident where Jenkins makes this random
- 16 | stop; is that correct?
- 17 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. And he sees two black men, somewhat different
- 19 descriptions. And he sees two cars. And you end up at that
- 20 point -- or Jenkins ends up questioning both men; is that
- 21 correct?
- 22 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 23 Q. And you, with Jenkins in 2015, what you did, you cuffed
- 24 these people; right?
- 25 **A.** Yes, sir.

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- 1 Q. And you knew at that time that Jenkins was doing something
- 2 wrong; right?
- 3 A. Yes, sir.
- 4 Q. And you knew at that time that Jenkins has stolen money
- 5 from people before; correct?
- 6 A. I'm not sure about the money part. I know about drugs,
- 7 and I'm not sure about the money.
- 8 Q. Okay. Well, this was not part of an investigation;
- 9 correct?
- 10 **A.** No.
- 11 Q. You never saw these people before?
- 12 A. No, I didn't.
- 13 **Q.** You had no prior knowledge as to who they were?
- 14 A. No.
- 15 **Q.** You had no probable cause whatsoever?
- 16 A. Right.
- 17 **Q.** You had no warrant; right?
- 18 A. Right.
- 19 Q. You weren't even actually out there trying to make
- 20 | arrests. You were going to try to meet Hendrix; correct?
- 21 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 22 Q. When Jenkins took that duffel bag out of the car and the
- 23 | money, you knew he wasn't going to turn it in; right?
- 24 | A. It was a slight -- I thought he might have turned it -- I
- 25 | didn't think he was going to take all of it. I thought he was

- 1 going to submit and keep a portion of it, not everything.
- 2 Q. You didn't arrest any of these men, did you?
- 3 **A.** No, sir.
- 4 | Q. So no one gets arrested. You take the duffel bag, and you
- 5 take their money; correct?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. And you did it by force; right?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 **Q.** Because at that time you were aiding and abetting Jenkins
- 10 in obtaining these goods; right?
- 11 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 12 Q. And you did it by force?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. Never once did you have the lawful thought that I'm doing
- 15 | police work here, did you?
- 16 **A.** No, sir.
- 17 **Q.** And it wasn't police work, was it?
- 18 A. No, it wasn't.
- 19 **Q.** You aided and abetted Jenkins in a robbery; correct?
- 20 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 21 | Q. And this is the one that after you aid and abet
- 22 | Sergeant Jenkins in a robbery, that you take the \$5,000 and you
- 23 | leave it in his car, right, in the trunk of his car?
- 24 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 25 Q. Did Jenkins ever say, "Dude, thanks for the 5 grand"?

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- 1 **A.** No.
- 2 Q. Just -- let me just segue real quick to the \$20,000
- 3 | Stevenson, the -- did Jenkins ever -- strike that.
- Just before -- after the \$5,000, did Jenkins ever approach
- 5 you and say, "I found 5,000 extra dollars in the trunk of my
- 6 | car"?
- 7 **A.** No.
- 8 Q. Did Jenkins ever indicate at all that he found the extra
- 9 \$5,000 in the car?
- 10 **A.** No.
- 11 Q. He never approached you at all?
- 12 **A.** No.
- 13 | Q. When you're down in the basement and you're divying up
- 14 Mr. Stevenson's money, does Jenkins say, "Do you really want
- 15 this 20,000?"
- 16 **A.** No.
- 17 | Q. Did he say anything like that?
- 18 **A.** No.
- 19 Q. Did he ask you, "Why don't you just leave it in the trunk
- 20 of my car again like you did last time with the 5,000?"
- 21 **A.** No.
- 22 Q. Did you refuse to take the \$20,000?
- 23 A. No, I didn't.
- 24 **Q.** Now, when I asked you about proffers and meeting with
- 25 | Government counsel and the FBI agents and TFO Sieracki in the

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- 1 | back row there, if I said you met with them on April 19th,
- 2 April 28th, May 10th, June 14th, July 5th, July 19th, and
- 3 November 8th, would that sound about reasonable as to the
- 4 | amount of meetings you had and proffer sessions with Government
- 5 | counsel and the agents?
- 6 A. Yes, sir.
- 7 | Q. In addition to that, you had at least two meetings with
- 8 Government counsel in preparation for your testimony; is that
- 9 | correct, sir?
- 10 A. I'm not sure it was two meetings.
- 11 **Q.** How many?
- 12 A. It might have been -- it might have been two, one or two,
- 13 yes.
- 14 Q. And, of course, at that time, as good a counsel as
- 15 Mr. Wise is, of course, he reviewed with you the questions he
- 16 was going to ask you and the areas he was going to ask you on
- 17 | the witness stand; is that fair to say, sir?
- 18 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. So when he questioned you, it was not a surprise, the
- 20 | questions; is that correct, sir?
- 21 A. It still was 'cause it was kind of rephrased a little
- 22 different, so . . .
- 23 | Q. Just rephrased, turned them around a little bit?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 Q. Now, you were asked on cross-examination if you were

charged with a 924(c) or, to put it another way, use of a 1 handgun in the commission of a crime of violence such as a 2 robbery. 3 Do you remember that? 4 5 Yes. Α. Well you do -- your lawyer here -- not here at the 6 7 moment -- but you did receive a copy of the indictment; is that correct? 8 Yes, sir. 9 Α. MR. PURPURA: And this will be marked as Defense 10 Exhibit No. 5 for identification. 11 BY MR. PURPURA: 12 13 And when you appeared before a Magistrate Judge -- not Her Honor Judge Blake, but originally in front of a 14 Magistrate Judge, the judge asked you, "Did you receive a copy 15 16 of the indictment?" 17 And you said, "Yes"; correct? Yes. 18 Α. And he asked you also, "Did you read that indictment or 19 20 review it with your attorney?" 21 And you said, "Yes"; isn't that correct, sir? 22 Α. Yes.

Defense Exhibit 4 for identification and ask you, sir, does

this appear to be the indictment in your particular case?

- 5 | a handgun in the commission of a robbery; correct?

- 7 | Q. And you've discussed this with your attorney (indicating)
- 8 is that correct?
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. Because your attorney told you, he told you how serious a
- 11 | 924(c) count is; isn't that correct, sir?
- 12 MR. WISE: Your Honor --
- 13 **THE COURT:** I think we're getting a little bit close

- 11 that handgun violation. And in your plea agreement, you do not
- 12 | have that handgun violation; isn't that correct, sir?
- 13 **A.** Yes, sir.
- 14 Q. So that was a consideration which caused you to plead as
- 15 | well, isn't that correct, to avoid that type of horrific
- 16 sentence?
- 17 **A.** Yes, I was -- yes.

MR. PURPURA: I believe Mr. Wise cited, I think, in the last trial Cropp. The case law in this circuit is really clear that counsel for the defense -- 'cause that's what the case law is addressed to -- cannot get into the specifics now as to what the guidelines are because they're just too complicated, in essence, for the layperson to understand, and we are precluded from doing that. And if defense can't do it, certainly the Government can't do it.

And in this case it is extremely misleading because the five-level bump doesn't equate to anything near to five consecutive years for 924(c). And that would be ridiculously complicated for even a lawyer to understand, let alone -- 'cause I don't know what the Government does -- to -- let alone the jury.

THE COURT: Mr. Wise.

MR. WISE: So Mr. Nieto specifically asked him what his guideline range were. He asked him about his base offense level. The only -- I'm not going to get into a calculation or a counterfactual calculation. The only point I want to make is they've both made the point that he wasn't -- he didn't admit to 924(c).

- 20 **A.** Yes, ma'am.
- 21 **Q.** And a lot of ammunition; correct?
- 22 A. Correct.
- 23 **Q.** And a hydraulic press?
- 24 A. All right.
- 25 | Q. What's a hydraulic press for?

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- 1 A. I ain't even answering that. I don't even know what it's
- 2 there for. It's used to put shocks on your car. You know
- 3 | that's what it's used for? It's used to put shocks on your car
- 4 for.
- 5 | Q. I'm asking what you used it for.
- 6 A. That's what it's used for, to put shocks on your car.
- 7 **Q.** That's what you used it for?
- 8 A. Okay. I already pleaded guilty to my case; you know what
- 9 I mean?

- 4 was in OCD before that.
- 5 Q. Okay. Well, when you were asked questions about these
- 6 traffic stops, you indicated that it was Detective Ward and
- 7 | Sergeant Avery were the two officers you could identify;
- 8 | correct?
- 9 A. I said other officers, ma'am. All them, they be together.
- 10 Avery -- I mean Sergeant Marcus Taylor and Maurice Ward be
- 11 | together like peanut butter and jelly every day in the same
- 12 car.

They were bringing to the Court's attention a body of law. I don't believe in my questioning that I attacked the specific fact of that he was complaining. In fact, I asked him about the fact he's been complaining about the money for every year since then. So I don't think this meets my attack on his credibility.

THE COURT: What is in here that -- I mean, I agree with Ms. Wicks. He's made it pretty clear.

MR. HINES: So reading from the bottom, I'd direct your attention here, Your Honor. He discusses the amount of money, how they brought it down in front of him, the exact amounts.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, I think -- and we can resolve the issue later whether it actually comes into evidence. But we've heard that he complained at prior dates about the money. This indicates that he also at the same time, February 26th of 2017 -- let's see. Tell them about the money.

All right. Well, no. Sorry. Looking at it again, what's in there that she has specifically challenged?

MR. HINES: She's challenged it. She's attacked his credibility generally. She's suggested that he's lying through her line of questioning that he didn't answer that he had an assault conviction when I asked the question that was -- the Court wanted to ask about his January 2014 episode. And she's attacked him every step of the way, challenged that other

officers were involved from the moment he was -- prior to
Mr. Taylor's arrest, he's been indicating that this is the same
exact sequence of events that he recalls, you know, before any
publicity in this case, which is also another avenue that's
been opened by defense counsel in their opening.

So his credibility has been attacked. And we should get it in in the second part of the rule to rehabilitate the declarant's credibility as a witness generally when attacked on another ground. And it does come into -- as substantive evidence under the rule as the notes to the Advisory Committee rules explain.

THE COURT: Well, I think you can ask him if he, you know, said the same things about the money in a prior complaint. You can get him to identify this so we have it in the record so that's not an issue later on.

I don't know at this point whether she has attacked his credibility in such a way as to make this entire letter admissible.
